Palm Ave. recalls a day of terror

The events of 9/11 are forever etched into the minds of those old enough to remember. It's a day etched in the memory the way President John F. Kennedy's assassination is remembered: It happened in an instant but will continue to be relived many times over and never forgotten.

On 9/11, three planes were hijacked. One hit the north tower of the World Trade Center and people were horrified as they watched it burn and then crumple to the ground. When the second plane hit the south tower, it became clear it wasn't an accident, but a terrorist attack on our soil.

Three thousand people died that day, and many first responders are currently liv-

Chemicals may cost \$15.7M

The city is continuing to investigate different methods to rid its drinking water of contaminants – but drilling new wells is a major possibility, at a cost of over \$15.7 million, according to a consultant's report.

Last year, the city awarded a professional services agreement to Dee Jaspas and Associates, Inc. to prepare an analytical report for a water treatment strategy for the water supply.

At this week's City Council meeting, Public Works Director Biridiana Bishop said that the city's water system relies on groundwater provided by six existing wells. "The useful life of a well can be 50-60 years," Bishop said. "Five of the wells exceed TCP 123 levels and three exceed nitrate levels. The only well that doesn't need treatment is Well #11." She also said that the city's wells are 10 to 20 years old.

According to the report, the recommendation is to drill four replacement wells and treat Well #12 for 123 TCP, Bishop said.

"This will be done with the goal of identifying well sites that will not require treatment."

Other alternatives included in the report were well head treatment, centralized treatment at one location or treatment at multiple locations.

"Five of the wells exceed TCP 123 levels and three exceed nitrate levels. The only well that doesn't need treatment is Well #11."

Bishop also reported that the city will be conducting a hydrogeologic study, to analyze how much water is circulated. That is expected to cost \$10,000, she said.

"The three wells have exceeded nitrates a few times in their lifespan, but they do not regularly exceed them, and Well #11 has only exceeded the level of nitrates once, so



Local chiropractor gives back

When Carol Funk Hamilton lived in Santa Barbara, a car accident that caused her a lot of pain and suffering also gave her the incentive to become a chiropractor.

"I went to a chiropractor over there, and he healed me," Hamilton said. "That's when I made up my mind to become a chiropractor."

Hamilton also took martial arts classes when she was younger. Between the classes and the chiropractor's help, her mind was made up to become a chiropractor and help others. "The chiropractor put me back together," she said.

Hamilton was born and raised in Wasco. She attended all Wasco schools from K-12 until she went away to college at Univer-

Waiting in Hamilton's outer office on a recent day was Wasco resident and community volunteer Janet Grundt. "I've been coming here since she opened her practice," Grundt said. "We've known each other since grammar school."

In addition to being a chiropractor, Hamilton is also a counselor, including people at Riverlakes Church in Bakersfield. "I would eventually like to spend more time counseling people," Hamilton said. "I volunteer at Riverlakes, and it has a great counseling program." Hamilton does a lot of Christian counseling whenever time allows.

"I'm very active in

Community Bible Study in Shafter at Valley Bible Church," Hamilton said. "They allow me to counsel there."

Hamilton shared that she has a 28-year-old son who is a computer expert working out of Bakersfield.

She is actively involved in the Wasco Rotary, as well as the Wasco Junior Woman's Club.

Hamilton has a long bucket list that she wants to complete before too long. "I would love to travel and retire in, say, five years," she stated.

A highlight for Hamilton was a 1980s scuba diving trip she and her husband took in Maui.

Californian columnist is Rotary speaker

Robert Price, the former *Bakersfield Californian* editor, columnist and author, joined the Wasco Rotary Club on Monday as their guest speaker.

Price was introduced by Rotary member Larry Pennell as a veteran journalist who has worked for the *Californian* as editor, author, columnist and writer for over 31 years.

Price said he is impressed with the fact that Wasco High School students can walk through graduation with an associate's degree from Bakersfield College on graduation day.

"Education is important," he said.

He then launched into his perspective of the future of print journalism. "Most people today get their news from their cell phone," Price said. He added that those who refuse to tap into the digital age are only hurting themselves and will be behind in what's happening."

Price feels that print journalism is a struggling industry. He sees the conflict as journalists wanting to give back to their communities by reporting the news that people want to hear; however, "It's a business, and the bottom line is the dollar and how many ads are sold," Price said.

He also touched on the digital economy and stated that those not invested in the digital age will be left behind.

With the instant access provided by the electronic media, print journalism won't be able to keep up.

When people open up their newspaper, they usually go to the obituary page first. "These are now our subscribers."

He then launched into another opinion regarding Kern County's economy. "We are an oil and agriculture state," he said.

He added that when he reads or hears about environmental groups attempting to get rid of the oil industry, he understands that it will change everything about California's economy. He questioned where California will go in the future.

"It's what we have depended on for years in Kern

County," Price said.

"The government has allocated \$1.5 million for a study from University of California to get rid of the oil industry. Kern County without oil will have more poverty than it does now."

Price then brought up the recent sale of the *Californian* and stated the new owners are from British Columbia.

"When the *Californian* was being sold, I tried to get a group of people together who I knew could purchase the paper, but they declined to invest in print journalism," Price said. "Luckily, we were able to keep our core people."

"We want to keep costs down as well as continue to publish."

Price also talked about the second edition of his book, "The Bakersfield Sound."

He described the book as a labor of love. "I grew up on rock and roll music," he said. "One of my earlier jobs at the paper was entertainment, and that is where I became familiar with the 'Bakersfield Sound.'"

He was able to develop a friendship with Buck Owens, and the two of them would get together and talk music. "In 1997, I started out with four Sunday articles on the 'Bakersfield Sound,'" Price said. "I met Buck Owens then, and we became friends. The paper tries to keep the 'Bakersfield Sound' alive today."

Price said the Bakersfield Chamber is incorporating the idea into their new slogan: "Bakersfield -- The sound of something better."

treatment isn't recommended at that well."

Bishop said that the city is aware that nitrate treatment may be necessary in the future and is planning accordingly.

"The cost to drill four new wells and treat Well #12 is \$15,765,902.68, or \$3,436,560.67 per well," Bishop said. She does not expect the costs of operation and maintenance for the wells to change from currently budgeted levels.

Bishop said that either all four wells could be drilled at the same time or separately, which will delay the completion of the project.

But regulations on permissible contaminants is constantly changing.

Last year, Acting Public Works Director Jeremy Bowman described the situation: "Many contaminants are regulated, but this is the first time 123 TCP levels have been regulated, even though it has been in our drinking water for quite some

time." He said that what was not considered a contaminant level on Monday may be changed to a contaminant level by Tuesday of that same week.

Councilmember Gilberto Reyna asked if new wells would guarantee there would be no more contaminants. "There is no guarantee," Curtis Skaggs of Dee Jasper said.

The council and the city attorney met in closed session to discuss "anticipated litigation," – but no details were released.

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Special finds at 2nd Hand Store

For some people, going to a secondhand store can be daunting; however, for others, it's a treasure trove of unique finds. No matter how you feel, the Wasco 2nd Hand Store has an eclectic collection of items likely to meet some need. Owner Maria Valdez is at the store Monday-Friday, sometimes from 11 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., and her son Miguel Valdez is there to help her when he is done with his Bakersfield College classes for the day. He is the youngest of three and he helps his mom out

California State University, Northridge, where his two older sisters are students – but his mother doesn't want him to go. "My mom doesn't want me to leave home," Miguel confessed. "I have a license, but my mother won't let me drive when we visit our family." Miguel was Maria's translator during the interview, but she understood several questions in English. The store is small in size but carries a variety of items such as crock pots still in their boxes, glassware, dishes, clothing and a lot of pictures hanging on the walls.

In front of the store are different pieces of furniture. A customer came in and dropped off a Hello Kitty piece of luggage in tip-top shape, ready for display. A couple different kinds of barstools also sit in front of the store. Two tall ones made of dark wood with soft and cushy riveted leather seats are going for \$20 each. On the other side of the front door is a stack of tall, black enamel barstools, which are numbered seven and being sold individually for \$20 apiece.

"Mom collects most of her items at yard sales in Bakersfield," Miguel said. "Most of our items are donated." Miguel said that furniture is the biggest seller. Inside the store is a tall, dark wood chest of drawers – taller than 5-foot-4. There are filled clothing racks and a large selection of neatly folded jeans to choose from.

Maria greets everyone who enters the store with a warm *hola*, while Miguel works behind the scenes to organize the contents. The store is located at 540 F St., but if you aren't careful, you could miss it. Store





WHS coach hopes for repeat of great season

Wasco High's varsity football coach, Chad Martinez, thinks the Tigers may take it all the way to the finals in this year's season.

Martinez greets anyone who steps into his classroom with a smile and a welcoming attitude. "We have a well-oiled machine working in Wasco," he said.

Martinez spent a year as football coach for Delano High School before arriving in Wasco. He has previously coached basketball, soccer and track, but football is where his heart lies. "This is my 10th year of coaching," he said. "I take pride in what I do."

Although Martinez was born and raised in the Inglewood section of Los Angeles County, he has adapted well to life in the Central Valley. "I love the smaller communities where everyone works together," he said. He added that he enjoys the way his circle of friends expands the longer he is at Wasco High.

One of the highlights of the team is when they operate the double wing-T offense. In layman's terms, this is when the center snaps the ball to the quarterback while the linebackers on each side carry out whatever play has been decided upon in the huddle. "This is a good strategy because it can confuse the opposing

team when they don't know whether the quarterback is going to run with the ball or hand it over to either his right or left linebacker," Martinez said.

He said Wasco prefers to play an offensive running game instead of a passing game. "It depends on who is available to catch the ball, whether or not we change our strategy. It's still early in the season to make such a change from a running offense to a passing offense."

Coach Martinez stated that this year the varsity team has 44 players, the junior varsity team has 38 players, and the freshman team – with 52 players – has the most.

"This year's team is more focused, and they understand and play faster than last year," he said. "We realize how good we were last year and will continue that."

"I consider Shafter High and Kennedy High the two teams to beat this year," Martinez said.

He also mentioned that because the offense was so good last year, he feels it enabled the defense an easier path to protect the end zone. "We have a very talented wide receiver in Andre Cordova," he added. "He's very good."

Martinez loves being involved in the football fever that hits the city during football season. "The Bear Boosters, alumni and everyone else has been

so welcoming and supportive," he said. "With dinner prepared for the players and coaches before every home game, the community has stepped up to support everyone involved."

ing with the physical and psychological pain of that act of terrorism.

It's been 18 years since that day, and many schools and businesses across the nation took time out to remember the lives that were sacrificed. Palm Avenue Middle School is just one of the many schools that spent some time honoring the event's significance.

Palm Avenue Principal Oscar Luna gathered his 11 a.m. lunch students and held a small balloon ceremony accompanied by words from the candidates for school president, Devanie Gaban and Diego Gomez.

While eating lunch, four students seated at a table shared their thoughts and feelings on the events of that day in 2001.

Seventh-grader Jules Wimberly was born in 2006 and learned about 9/11 from his teachers. "I was in third grade with Mrs. Ramirez at Prueitt when we first talked about 9/11," Jules said. "My parents don't talk about it."

Another seventh-grader, Giselle Acevedo, was also born in 2006, long after the attack. "I found out about 9/11 in either third or fourth grade," she said. "We have to honor those who died."

Johnathan Castillo, who was born in 2008, stated that one of his teachers made the class watch the video. "Back then, I was

emotional," he said. "I was in first grade, and I cried."

The fourth member of their lunch group, seventh-grader Jose Rodriguez, was born in 2007. "I also cried when I saw the video," he said. "Especially when I saw a plane hit the first building."

Counselor Elena Contreras was at home getting ready for work. "I was saddened," she said. "Everybody was in school unable to work. So many people were crying."

Principal Luna was a senior in high school on 9/11

and watched it on TV. "It was such a big deal," Luna said. "All we could think about was family. We had to be patriots." Luna added that, as each day passed, it got worse and worse as more information was given out.

The young students all knew that 19 people hijacked three planes and that 3,000 people died, plus the deaths of first responders and many who were involved in the clean-up effort.

A sign on the wall at Palm Avenue reads, "Never let us forget."
