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Return of popular activities top Rose Festival

The Wasco Rose Festival is back to being held the first weekend after Labor Day, and many special activities are planned.

Over three days, a number of events will take place.

There will be a kick-off on Thursday, Sept. 8, with the Miss Wasco Rose Queen Pageant at the Wasco Union High School Auditorium at 6 p.m. It promises to be full

of entertainment as the candidates have been practicing since May. Be on the lookout for ticket sales at the end of August.

On Friday, Sept. 9, the Wasco Elks Ladies will hold a Wine and Roses Honored Guest Reception" where the grand marshals will be recognized and celebrated. The event will be held at the Wasco Elks Lodge from 6 to 10 p.m.

It will be the first year that the Wasco Elks Ladies host the event. All proceeds will go to their College Scholarship Fund.

The festival culminates on Saturday, Sept. 10 with a full day of excitement. At 7:30 a.m., the Recreation and Parks District puts on the 'Somewhere Over the Rainbow Color Blast Fun Run at Barker Park.

Also on Saturday, at 10 a.m., the Wasco Rose Parade will begin on 7th and D streets,

to Poplar Avenue, ending in Barker Park. Over 50 parade entrants are anticipated to participate.

Another component of Saturday festivities will be the festival in the park from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. There will be a myriad of vendors, a car show, a DJ, a beer garden and an art show hosted by the Wasco Woman's Club.

There are also many other programs, including universal breakfast in the classroom and universal lunch at no charge to parents.





Books in Motion makes kids books come alive

The Books in Motion program came to the Shafter Library and Learning Center last Friday to perform "Splat the Cat with a Bang and a Clang." BIM is a collaboration of the Kern Dance Alliance, a nonprofit dance advocacy organization supporting and promoting dance and the arts in Kern County, and Kern Literacy Council, a nonprofit dedicated to transforming lives through literacy.

By summer's end, eight Kern County

dance groups will have given more than two dozen Books in Motion performances at libraries across Kern County. They're bringing classics like "Peter and the Wolf" and "The Nutcracker" and modern picture books like "Sock Monkey Boogie Woogie, Cha-Cha Chimps, Groovicorns" and "The Rainbow Fish" to life with a combination of acting and dance.

The McLaughlin Dance Collaborative performed "Splat the Cat with a Bang and

a Clang," in which Splat wants to join his friends' band but can't play any instruments or sing. It's a sweet, funny story about discovering what you can do well, even if it's something unusual or unexpected, and being included by your friends.

The dancers then invited the children in the audience to learn the dance. Shafter's kids proved to be quick learners, and in five minutes, they were ready to dance along with the song, clapping, jumping, and pretending to play guitar and sing.

Next up was a crafts activity based on

the book's main character. Finally, each child was given a copy of "Splat the Cat with a Bang and a Clang" (and a bonus book, "Sock Monkey Boogie Woogie)" courtesy of the Kern Literacy Council and its sponsors.

He attended John L. Prueitt Elementary School, Karl Clemens Elementary School, Thomas Jefferson Middle School and Wasco High School.

Recently Ornelaz received the Pat Tillman Foundation Scholars Award. The award is named in honor of the former professional football player who left his career to enlist in the army and later died in the line of duty.

He beat out over 1,000 applicants from across the nation. The recognition was based on military and community service and intellectual pursuit.

"I received a substantial amount of money to cover my future and current educational endeavors," said Ornelaz.

He said he learned a lot from his military experiences, like perseverance and the ability to adapt.

"That has helped me in all my past and current goals," said Ornelaz.

After his discharge completing his term in 2014, he left for Amherst College, graduating with bachelor's degree in history and sexuality, women and gender studies.

Leading the way in ag education

The Wasco FFA Chapter is a pathway to success for those students interested in agriculture. It is a youth leadership organization rooted in the industry, benefitting participating students at Wasco High School from all it offers.

"Our Wasco ag program is special because we are really focused on hands-on experience. We have a family structure and we build on student interest," Anthony Farao, an agriculture teacher and FFA advisor explained.

There is a leadership component where students learn life skills, how to conduct themselves as a professional, work with others and develop their public speaking skills.

FFA curriculum includes a supervised agriculture experience, where students carry out independent study projects.

Some raise livestock on campus or at home, grow and sell plants, work in the fields, have their own business mowing lawns, or work in an office related to the agriculture business. Others are farm hands working at a cattle, goat or sheep ranch.

Projects are acceptable as long as they have something to do with agriculture, giving the students real-world experience.

The classroom curriculum is key to the program. Students can choose one of three pathways: animal science, plant science and ag mechanics.

There are also two other pathways on the nontraditional side, in partnership with the WACP Wonderful Academy, where the focus is on ag business and ag mechanics.

Within those pathways, there are many diverse classes students can take to build their ag knowledge.


"It prepares them for life because as students take advantage of ag education and they really put themselves in a place to grow, I think it can change their life," said Farao.

"Some students would have never gone to college or found a career or a passion for something otherwise. It really can change the trajectory of their lives."

In response to the cancellation of the onsite Kern County Fair due to covid, FFA leadership working in collaboration with administration and community support to establish the Charles Craig Classic in 2020.

It was named after an agriculture teacher who worked at WHS for many years and made a tremendous impact on the students and in the community.

"The Classic is a livestock show to give students another opportunity to be in

the ring and have their animals and skills judged by another person before they compete at the Kern County Fair," said Department Chair Denise Morales.

Morales has been with the FFA program at Wasco High School for the last 25 years.

"I have taught at four schools, and far and away, the students here are the best on the planet. I tell them that all the time. Both of my children are products of this program."

The Classic incorporates two classes. The first class is where the quality of the animal is assessed. "It is kind of a body-building competition but for animals," said Farao.

The second class is showmanship and is judged on how well students demonstrate their knowledge and ability to show the muscle of that animal.

The Classic showcases students from North Kern County, including Wasco, Taft, Delano, McFarland and Shafter.

"It has been amazing with the quality and character of our students. Not only our students but students from all of the other programs that come to our school," said Farao.

The three-day event will take place on Sept. 9, 10 and 11 at the Wasco High School District farm.

"We are looking forward to this event. It's exciting to see the community support our students while they demonstrate their skills and win awards.

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SNIP clinic makes its way back to Wasco



crisis of pets dying in shelters that do not have homes," said registered veterinary technician Kandice Webb.

"These pets end up here because of irresponsible owners breeding their pets without regard for the crisis in our shelters."

The event was aimed at reducing the population of strays.

"I wish more people would spay and neuter, and we wouldn't have such a problem," said Animal Control Officer Marco Silva.

Spay and neutering have many pet health benefits, even preventing many cancers.

"It can help stop pets from needing to roam, prevent accidental litters and prevent other reproductive diseases," Webb said.

The city paid for the event.

"As funds come in, like this grant from PG&E, we offer this to our residents at no cost. This helps them, especially when everything is going up like gas and food," said Public Works Director Luis Villa.

"This is an expense they won't have. It is a savings for them while getting their animal fixed."

Villa said the issue is that there are a certain number of people that don't care for their pets.

"Some abandon their animals, and that is what we are trying to avoid."

The event was successful, with 57 animals getting spayed and neutered.

"It was a great turnout, and many residents took advantage of getting their dogs fixed, vaccinated and chipped," said Silva.

In addition to spaying and neutering, SNIP offered the parvo vaccine for \$15, the rabies vaccine for \$15 and microchipping for \$25.

Shelter worker Eulalia Barraza said the goal is for people to educate themselves and think about their dog or cat.

"It is a lifetime commitment, and one has to be a responsible pet owner."

She said the majority of calls they get are from low-income families.

"This service is a great opportunity for them, as well as for the overall community."

Vicki Newman came with her daughter's dog and her dog. "It is wonderful because it is good for people that can't afford it and for citizens that need and want to get it done," said Newman.

"It stops them from having babies and

multiplying."

Giselle Carrillo brought her dog.

"This free service helps save money, and I want my dog to be healthy. She is an important member of the family. I love my dog."

Webb said that if we can get public support, we will see a reduction in euthanasia.

"It is sad. They are young, happy, healthy, friendly animals and after a week in the shelter, they can get euthanized."

The clinic was a step toward a solution to addressing the problem.

"I would like to thank our employees that helped put it together. It was a team effort and clearly shows their dedication to make events like this happen for our residents," said Villa.

"I also want to thank the residents that came out to help us decrease the number of strays."
