

Wasco Union Elementary School District students have already started their new school year.

After summer break, students began their annual trek to their campus on Monday. Two schools in particular were anxiously awaiting the beginning of school so that their new campuses could be experienced.

The new James A. Forrest Elementary School, with its Spanish-style architecture and curved archways, was a welcoming site to the parents excited that their children were attending a brand-new school.

In another part of the city, parents and students looked forward to the new construction at Palm Avenue. Several students took pictures on the stairs in the front of the school.

According to Assistant Superintendent Brad Maberry, attendance at the schools on Monday was good: Teresa Burke had 594, Karl Clemens had 559, James Forrest had 596, John Pruitt had 592, Palm Avenue had 594 and Thomas Jefferson had 544.

Some students at Forrest braved sitting on top of the school sign while their father took a photograph.

At Palm Avenue, many students gathered in groups to survey their surroundings. Several were comforted when Outreach Coordinator Kimberly Rodarte arrived on the school site. She was warmly greeted by those who knew her from Thomas Jefferson.

District welcomes back staff

Superintendent Kelly Richers welcomed everyone to the new gym on the Palm Avenue Middle School campus.

"This year, all the school sites had some sort of construction happening, which made working at the

School district buys 5 new electric cars

The Wasco Union Elementary School District will double its fleet of electric cars used by staff to 10.

Grant money will offset the cost of the \$35,000 vehicles, leaving the district to pay \$15,000.

Superintendent Kelly Richers informed the board the district received a grant from the San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution

Control District for the EV vehicles. The grant will cover \$100,000 of the total purchase price; the bid for the vehicles was \$177,377.35 from Three Way Chevrolet.

"Each vehicle originally costs \$35,475.47, and with the grant from the Pollution Control District, the vehicles will only cost the district \$15,000.00 each" Richers said.

After a closed session, Richers reported that the district hired six new employees.

school sometimes very difficult," Richers said. "Some schools were more inconvenienced than others."

Richers refreshed everyone's memory about how the new school and the reconfiguring of Palm Avenue from an elementary school to the district's second middle school occurred.

He mentioned that Karl Clemens lost its field for half a year and added that Forrest Elementary will have their field in the middle of September.

"Our board of trustees realized several years ago that the district needed more

space for the increasing number of students entering," Richers said. "Our middle school, Thomas Jefferson, was well over 600 students, and we knew we needed two middle schools. Palm Avenue was the most realistic one to renovate."

According to Richers, the cost to build the new elementary school was \$26 million and the cost to renovate Palm Avenue was \$34 million, well within the allotted monies available after a school bond was passed.

He also added that during the construction, Teresa Burke added four new classrooms and a bathroom.

When everyone settled down, Rich-

ers acknowledged each school undergoing construction and asked each school's staff to stand for recognition. He then introduced each principal individually and they, in turn, introduced their new teachers to everyone.

Some teachers relocated to the new elementary school, while others changed grades, but every group that had to go through some sort of construction was acknowledged. Richers also had the 2018 Palm Avenue staff stand for recognition and praised them for putting up with so much construction while continuing to provide instruction to students during the school year.

In addition, Richers reaffirmed that the Maintenance Operations and Transportation building will be completed this winter. He joked that the hard part would be coming when they had to move everything from their old site to the new one.

Attendees were overheard commenting on how beautiful the gymnasium is and that all 480 employees were able to be seated at round tables on the floor.

Richers announced that last year, 2018, none of the schools were below educational standards and none of the schools were in any danger of not meeting test scores standards.

HELPING FARMERS HURT BY TRADE DISPUTES

BAKERSFIELD - Personal Ag Management, a local leader in agriculture relief programs, will host a free informational event Friday, Aug. 16 in Shafter for farmers impacted by trade disputes.

Program experts will review the new Market Facilitation Program (MFP) at the 10 a.m. meeting inside Shafter Veterans Hall, 309 California Ave., including how to enroll and answer questions about available farm aid.

The MFP will make payments to producers of certain crops as well as dairy and hog producers expanding on the crops from 2018. It will include previous farmers and ranchers who may not have previously qualified due to Adjusted Gross Income thresholds.

The new program, part of a trade relief package announced last month, covers these Kern County crops: alfalfa hay, barley, corn, dried beans, extra-long staple cotton, oats, rye, safflower, sorghum, triticale, upland cotton, wheat, almonds, fresh grapes, fresh sweet cherries, pistachios, walnuts, dairy milk and hogs. Additional crops are listed at www.farmers.gov/manage/mfp.

How to get a grant Coalition gets tips from Wonderful

Grants were the focus of this month's Wasco Coalition presentations. The director of community relations, Manuel Cantu, offered an update on the company's grant process. Wonderful provides hundreds of thousands of dollars of contributions to the community in which it operates each year. "We offer grants from \$50 to \$50,000 to nonprofits and organizations within our area, including Avonal, Wasco, Shafter, Del Rey, McFarland and Sanger," Cantu said. He provided a Powerpoint presentation to give the details on what makes to make a grant application

successful. He stated that a winning proposal will effectively demonstrate:

- A community need,
- A viable program/project to address that need,
- The capacity and competency to carry out the proposed program/project, and
- Financial sustainability (grant should be less than 25% of the total organization's budget).

Additionally, he said that a winning proposal will:

- Answer all the questions,
- Be clearly and concisely written, and
- Have SMART goals.

Cantu provided a timeline for grant

proposal applications:

- August 1, 2019 – Application open
- August 31, 2019 – Application deadline
- October/November 2019 – Finalist interviewed
- December 2019 – Awards announced

He also provided the web address where people can request an e applications: communitygrants@wonderful.com. Following the presentation, each group gave a brief description of its latest projects. Groups included the City of Wasco, Wasco High School, the Downtown Business Association, the county, social services and religious organizations.

The City Council, by a 3-2 vote, accepted City Manager Scott Hurlbert's resignation at a special meeting of the council on Tuesday night. The council appointed the city's chief financial executive, Administrative Services Manager Jim Zervis, as acting city manager. He is a former city manager for the City of Wasco. Details of Hurlbert's termination package were disclosed in a separation agreement obtained by *The Press* Wednesday morning. City Attorney Marco Martinez said that Hurlbert will receive one year's pay, plus a severance package, amounting to \$248,718. Hurlbert makes approximately \$199,032 in base pay. He had signed to a five-year contract just last year, leaving four years remaining. The agreement overrides his contract, and limits any legal action by the city or Hurlbert. For the payment, he gives up normal protections, including for harassment and bias, under the law. Such an agreement, or "release," is not unusual when a separation is negotiated.

that she was ruling. This reminds me of what is going on here. It seems all about power and that it is just a big game," he said. Woody Colvard voiced concerns he has had for a few months. The former mayor and council member said that he had heard the rumors of what was happening and the reasons behind the actions but didn't want to pre-judge anyone. "But, after attending the last few meetings, and seeing for myself what is being done and said, I believe that there is truth to the rumors."

Former Councilmember Eli Espericueta said that Scott is a good person and that it seems that this has been a quick turnaround from a couple of weeks ago. "You said, Manuel [Garcia], that the council had done a great job in fixing the roads and alleys, and that is the city manager and the staff. Now, he is being forced to resign like he hasn't done his job? I think it is not true. It is your own fault that you three ended up looking like fools by trying to put your names on that memorial. It wasn't anybody else's fault. You guys looked like fools and now all of a sudden, this is happening."

There was a smattering of laughter at one point in the proceedings when a resident said that she knew the people on the council and knew that they wanted to do the right thing, particularly when Garcia said, "We are not bad people."

Councilmember Cesar Lopez remarked on when he repeatedly smirked when addressed by speakers at the dais. At the last City Council meeting, the mayor pro-tem said that there were people in the community who agreed with him, but they didn't feel comfortable coming to the meetings and would not come to speak.

Christine Wilson, who retired as city clerk last year, had some of the strongest worded remarks of the evening. "I worked for this city for 28 years, and I am ashamed right now for this city and the way it is being ran. Gilbert [Alvarado], I cannot believe that you have been on the council for 10 years and are just now concerned about knowing what is in the charter and how the city works."

She went on to say that Hurlbert was always dependable, honest and a man with integrity. "I have seen what you do, Gilbert, when you do not get your way in a meeting or an issue you believe in. It is always the city manager's fault or someone else's fault." She said the city has built a reputation

for being strong, stable and independent, but now" the city is more of a punchline or sideshow." It was asked if the people would be able to ask questions or make remarks after the meeting was reopened, and they were told the council would decide afterward. When the meeting reconvened, the announcement of the acceptance was made by City Attorney Martinez and the council members exited without comment. When contacted, Hurlbert — who did not attend the meeting -- said that he had no comment, and that there would be a statement at a later date.

A statement was released by the city Wednesday afternoon, headlined "Shafter City Council Accepts City Manager's Resignation":

"At a special city council meeting held on August 13, 2019, the Shafter City Council and City Manager Scott Hurlbert mutually agreed to end Hurlbert's employment agreement with the City effective that night. The City Council accepted Mr. Hurlbert's resignation and approved a separation and release agreement that confirms the terms of his separation from the City. The City Council also named Administrative Services Director James Zervis as the Acting City Manager."

"Mr. Hurlbert had been with the City since 2005 and became the City Manager in March of 2014. The mutual agreement to end the City Manager's employment relationship with the City now means that the City Council will begin the search for a new City Manager. Mayor Gilbert Alvarado said he will be working on a transition plan to hire a new City Manager with the City Council and the City's management team at an upcoming City Council meeting.

"Mayor Alvarado also said "The City Council and the residents of Shafter wish to thank Mr. Hurlbert for his years of service to the City. We believe we have a great team in place at the City and employees who will make the transition to a new city manager successful."

Zervis was listed as the contact, along with the telephone number for City Hall -- 661-746-5000.

Vasquez demonstrated the bike to everyone; however, some of those who made smoothies were not strong enough to peddle the bike, so he assisted.


Vasquez delighted the kids by making chef's hats for them out of white construction paper.

A lawyer once asked Jesus, "Teacher, what is the greatest commandment?" Jesus replied, "Love God with everything in you, and secondly love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:36-40). Who are our neighbors?

There are nine virtues that Paul writes about in the book of Galatians that describe what a life of a Christian should look like.

To put it plainly, if you want to live like Jesus, be sure that you are bearing the fruit of the Spirit. "Love" is the first one, since it is the foundation to the other graces. The type of the love that Paul is writing to the church in Galatia is "agape" -- to love the underserving, despite rejection and disappointment. It is the love that Jesus demon-

strated on the cross for you and me.

I have discovered that it is simple to love those who are naturally lovable, but rather difficult to love people that might have hurt us, rejected us or that we feel do not deserve to be loved.

Paul is writing about a type of love that is not optional -- we don't get to choose who we get to demonstrate our love to; rather, we must love like Jesus loves! Jesus knew that it would be difficult to love our neighbor at times, since our neighbors are all the people that surround us, and this is why he made it a commandment.

Friend, I encourage you that this week you love like Jesus loves!
