The Wasco High Tigers couldn't dig out of a first half hole when they traveled to Templeton to take on the Eagles on Friday night, dropping their season opener by a score of 39-22.

"Offensively, we had 22 points, but defensively we gave up 39," Free Safety Kevin Chavez said. "There were lots of mistakes given out. We didn't play the game we could have, but we are moving forward and bouncing back this week."

The Tigers couldn't get their offense started in the first quarter, with the Templeton defense stifling the Tigers' running game. The Eagles then turned their opportunities into points, with a touchdown on their first possession of the game, going up 7-0.

The Eagles made the score 15-0 after they recovered a Tigers' fumble, scoring on a quarterback keeper

Amtrak station to be demolished Monday

The Wasco Amtrak station will be demolished Monday, March 29, Toni Tinoco, information officer for the High Speed Rail Authority, announced.

The High Speed Rail Authority also reported that it has provided 5,500 jobs and a future line that will extend from Los Angeles to San Francisco. The portion of the rail that will be completed soonest is the track from Merced to Bakersfield.

The authority announced that the rail will run 100% on renewable energy.

"It will be all electric all the time," the High Speed Rail Authority said in a statement. "The authority is committed to using 100% renewable energy to operate our trains and facilities."

During construction, rail crossings throughout northern



 Templeton cashed in a couple of plays later with a long pass that set up a touchdown run, giving the Eagles a 22-0 lead. Templeton added a field goal at the end of the first half, giving them a 25-0 lead at the break. The Tigers started the second half on a promising note, but a touchdown was called back when they were flagged for a holding call, giving the Eagles another chance at the

end zone. "A couple of touchdowns were called back on us, but they weren't enough to bring Wasco back home," ASB Commissioner of Male Athletics Ricardo Carriedo said. Templeton stretched their lead to 31-0 a couple of minutes later. As the third quarter was running down, the Tigers got their first score of the season when Christian Alvarez broke off a big run and ended up in the end zone, making


the score 32-7. With seven minutes to go, the Tigers made it interesting with another score by Andre Cardova, cutting the Eagles lead to 32-14. The Eagles answered back with another big run by their quarterback giving them a 39-14 lead. Gallery to salute Vietnam veterans

The Portrait of a Warrior Gallery in downtown Bakersfield will be holding a ceremony on March 29 in observance of National Vietnam Veterans Day.



The gallery had a display honoring Ricky Barraza, who sacrificed his life serving our country. Barraza's birthday was recognized last week at the gallery.

The gallery is honoring the 176 Kern County veterans who lost their lives in Vietnam. A bell will be rung as well as a Roll Call being conducted, announcing each of the veterans' names.

According to Ed Gaede, a Shafter man who is on the board at the gallery, this will be a special ceremony that honors those local heroes who served in the Vietnam War.

In addition to the Vietnam War ceremony, the gallery also recently honored Ricky Barraza, who lost his life while serving his country. A picture and plaque containing Barraza's medals is on display in honor of Barraza's birthday.

The gallery is in the process of installing over 82,000 replica dog tags, each representing a soldier from Kern County who is missing in action. Kern County residents will be able to see the history of county veterans. Gaede said that at least five of those will be dog tags of Shafter soldiers, including Harvey Havins, the first soldier from Kern County who was killed in World War II.

Gaede said he wants to see these warriors who have sacrificed their lives for us have a proper place to be recognized and honored.

"This isn't about me, I am just a man who loves being a part of this amazing cause," Gaede said.

In addition to the ceremony, Shafter author Barry Bongberg will be signing copies of his newly published book, "Dear Mom and Dad, Letters from Vietnam." Bongberg began a project typing up a box of letters

that he had written to his parents when he was stationed overseas for 23 months. Bongberg was encouraged to make the letters into a book, which is now available on Amazon and directly from Bongberg.

Meadows: Development in city strong amid pandemic

Development in the city is staying strong amid the pandemic as a drive-thru car wash and an Amazon fulfillment center prepare to open their doors.

With the majority of the businesses having to at least restrict hours, services, and sometimes close altogether, the pandemic has taken its toll.

According to Bob Meadows, business development director, the city had begun focusing on attracting companies with

unique assets, such as the rail yard that can help companies ship goods, as well as a state-of-the-art fiber optic network.

One of the newest additions is the Amazon Fulfillment Center that is going in at the Wonderful Logistics Park. This 1,000,000-square-foot facility will attract about 1,000 jobs for residents, ranging from sorting, packaging, shipping and management. Amazon is taking a "spec building" that is on the site and doing the renovations

in time for a proposed November opening date.

In addition to Amazon, there are several other businesses coming to the city including a drive-thru car wash at the intersection of Central Avenue and Highway 43, the site of the former Brookside Deli and Shafter Press offices. This site was sold by the city to Rick Jhaj, whose family owns and operates the Taco Bell in Shafter. The car wash is expected to bring about 30 jobs and give the city its first drive-thru car wash.

Several roll-off trucks were stationed at the Shafter Aquatic Center parking lot to carry off items not normally picked up in regular trash collections. Residents dropped off a variety of items in-

cluding electronics, mattresses, and furniture. This was the second event held in the past month. An event in Wasco at Barker Park attracted a large number of vehicles as well. According to director of the event, Lynnnda Martin, of American Refuse, this event had an "outstanding" turnout and came after a long period of time since the last event. Other events had been canceled due to the pandemic.

"This event had such a great turnout I think because it had been such a long time since the last event," Martin said. "Residents were taking advantage of the opportunity to get rid of their items without having to load them up for a trip to the landfill."

The event also had the support of local officials as well, with City Manager Gabriel Gonzales and council member Gilbert Alvarado lending a hand with unloading residents' items from their vehicles.

Martin said drop-off events alleviate the problem of illegal dumping in the area. With

the pandemic keeping a lot of residents home, a lot of projects have begun and a number of bulky items end up at the landfill or in alleyways or on the side of the road.

The opportunity to dump the items for free in town helps keep the city free of clutter as well as saving the city money. The city would otherwise have to pay workers to pick up the illegally dumped items.

"Events such as this are a win-win for everyone. We hope that there will be other events to follow, helping to keep our cities clean and our alleys clear," concluded Martin.

and southern California are being upgraded or eliminated to reduce traffic congestion.


"This improves safety and cuts Greenhouse Gas emissions from idling vehicles," Tinoco presented in the information sheet.

"In blended/shared corridors, trains will be slowed to 110 miles per hour, as required by regulations," the sheet read. "However, in

other areas speeds will top 220 miles per hour."

In addition, the High Speed Rail contracts state \$10 million in funding has been awarded for station area planning efforts, which will help create "thriving and sustainable station area districts."

"Planning among key cities creates meaningful connections and economic opportunities," the information sheet stated.
