New planning commissioners approved

The Shafter City Council approved two candidates that were interviewed at the last council meeting to be a part of the Shafter Planning Commission. David Puizer and Lovedeep Joshan were approved to serve

The Planning Commission's duties include reviewing and acting on matters related to planning and development in Shafter. The role of the commission is to work with the City Council to ensure that the common

on the commission, beginning in January.

vision for the community is realized. They also advise the council on land use matters, zoning ordinances, and other matters related to land use and the General Plan of the city.

The council also approved a contract with Aquatic Design Group to plan and complete the improvements needed to the Shafter Aquatic Center. Public Works Michael James said that approval needed to get done so the work could be started within the next few months. James said that if

approved, and the company can begin work on schedule, work should be done on the pool and the center by June 2024, at a cost of \$204,000. This contract is just for the design and planning of the improvements.

James said that the city also received bids on the work at Mannel Park which is a shading structure and upgrade. The contract was awarded to DL Brown with a bid of \$103,000.

During Public Comment, Jeff Martin of American Refuse updated the council on the city's Roll-out program, replacing all resi-

dents' trash cans with the three cart system. Martin said that everything has been going smooth and there only remains another 500 customers who need to be rolled out, which will be done in January and February.

James also said that the city needs a budget amendment of \$1.3 million for construction on Water Well 21, which is located at the Wonderful Industrial Park. This well was put in a year ago for agriculture use. This ag-use is no longer needed and it can be made suitable for residential and commercial use.

Prout and Olvera still leading

There were no real changes in the direction of local races when the Kern Elections Office updated the results from the Nov. 8 election **SHAFTER**

For the two open seats on the Shafter City Council, Mayor Cathy Prout still holds a sizeable lead, accumulating 775 votes, outdistancing her opponents with 35% of the vote. Gustavo Olvera is still leading incumbent Cesar Lopez by 24 votes, 541-517, with 24.5%, compared to Lopez's 23.46 percent. Rafael Zamudio has 16.8%.

In other races, David Valadao has taken the lead over Assemblymember Rudy Salas, receiving 52%, compared to 47% for Salas. In early results, Salas had a lead over Valadao, but Valadao now has over 30,000 votes, with Salas having around 27,000 votes.

Shannon Grove, a Shafter native, will easily retained her State Senate seat, beating Democrat Susanne Gundy with

In Wasco, Ernie Sanchez, Cherlyee Wegman and Richard Reding are in the lead for the three available seats on the Wasco Union Elementary School District Board.

On the Wasco High School District Board race, Juan Bernal, Mario Juarez and Carl Joe Hively are leading for the three available seats on that Board.

Votes continue to be counted, with final results being available within the next week or two, with results becoming official by Dec. 9 - a month after the election.

Council moves forward on police force

On Tuesday at the regular City Council meeting, the appointment of Mr. Charlie Fivecoat as Transitional Chief of Police was unanimously approved. City Manager Scott Hurlbert was authorized to finalize and execute the contract and proceed with the hiring process.

According to a press release, this comes after earlier in the fall this year that the City Council directed staff to begin the process of starting up a local police department. As

part of that, the first step was establishing a "start-up team" consisting of the Chief of Police, Lieutenant and Police Records ad-

The team would ensure that all state and federal certifications are in place, research opportunities, establish department policies and procedures, acquire equipment and begin the recruitment process.

Currently, the City of Wasco contracts with the Kern County Sheriff's Office

(KCSO) for law enforcement services. Because of ongoing staffing challenges, the City and the KCSO have explored the possibility that the Wasco Sub Station may eventually be closed.

The press release further stated that to realize a coordinated transition, the Wasco "start-up team" will work closely with KCSO to develop a plan to ensure this goal is met.

Hurlbert said, "The sheriff's deputies here in Wasco do a fantastic job. But the staffing difficulties are significant, and no one expects that to change right away. Both

parties feel it is best to get out ahead of this and work together toward a smooth transi-

tion of duties." Fivecoat comes with tremendous credentials. He has 33 years of law enforcement experience and has served over the years in various capacities involving security management. Fivecoat is also a US Army Airborne veteran and has served as contract Chief in Wasco, McFarland and Tehachapi. From 2006 to 2011, he was Chief of Police for the City of Shafter.

'C.S. Lewis' returns to Ford stage

David Payne brought his one man show, "Christmas with CS Lewis" to the Shafter Ford Theater on Sunday, giving two performances last weekend.

Payne portrayed the acclaimed author who was the creator, among many others, of "The Lion, Witch, and the Wardrobe", a best selling childrens' book that has become a standard for essential reading.

Payne told the tale of an encounter between the author and fellow author JJ Tolkien, who was responsible for the Lord of the Rings trilogy, to a group of Americans who had spent a Christmas at his house. Tolkien, who was a faithful Christian, went to dinner with Lewis when Lewis's faith had been failing for years. As Payne told it, Lewis's mother died when he was nine years old and he was soon after sent off to boarding school. Lewis said, "I could not believe that there was a Christ Child and a God that would ignore all of my fervent

prayers that I said to heal my mother." Lewis's crisis of faith continued into his young adult years and beyond, until that fateful encounter. Tolkien told Lewis that our God was not a myth, that He was real

"Christmas began to mean what it did when I was a happy child, full of hope, faith and happiness," said Lewis. Payne has been portraying Lewis for

over 20 years. After answering a casting call, Payne has been wowing audiences with his mesmerizing display of Lewis's speech, mannerisms and wit.

Payne had the crowd listening intently, laughing, and touched all in the same show.

The performances were originally scheduled for 2021, but due to the pandemic, Payne's schedule was conflicted and they had to be rescheduled. For many in the audience, the wait was apparently well

We work with students to empower them to be advocates in their communities for positive change. We have internships for any seniors graduating who can apply once they begin their first year of college and are undergraduates," project coordinator Celeste Ramos said.

In other news, Sergeant Charles Shinn of the KCSO was encouraged and pleased to report that on October 20, an arrest was made in connection with the murder of Guadalupe Chavez that took place on December 4, 2021.





City addresses illegal dumping

ance, American Refuse, local groups, and **WASCO** nesses are partnering to keep Wasco beautiful. A community clean-up day will take

place on Saturday, November 19, at Barker Park from 9:00 am to 12:00

Residents can drop off their bulky waste items at the event, like old furniture, home appliances, TVs, mattresses, e-waste and water heaters.

Trash, commercial waste, construction or remodeling scraps, hazardous materials and green waste cannot be accepted.

If one does not have transportation to transport the waste, there is a service for curbside pickup. Code Compliance will go to your address and pick it up. There is a maximum of four

This is only open to the first 30 residents who register. Keep in mind that the pickup must be within city limits.

Sergio Gonzalez of Code Compliance said it is important to have the pickup component because many residents don't have an opportunity to take items to the dump themselves.

"Many residents don't have vehicles, and citizens rely on these community clean-ups to remove items from their property," Gonzalez said.

He added, "Overall, we are trying to prevent as much illegal dumping

as possible and provide an avenue for residents to get rid of their bulky trash conveniently."

Gonzalez believes it is an opportunity for the community to show pride in the city and an opportunity for the city to stay connected with residents showing them that they care.

According to him, illegal dumping is an issue around town in the alleys,

"This clean up is definitely helping to keep the illegal waste down."

On the event day, volunteers will also assist by working together to clean up alleys.

"We will provide all of the bags, gloves and tools to do so."

Code Compliance is looking for more volunteers to help.

"It is all volunteer based. We have sponsors and donations, but the actual groundwork has to be handled by volsaid.

"Whether these volunteers are minors or adults, they will be chaperoned when they clean up trash throughout the neighborhoods."

Laws are written if there is trash with an address associated with it; you are held liable and can be cited.

"One can be cited for having trash around their homes and in their alleys,"

Gonzalez said.

Part of Code Compliance's goal is responding to properties that have unwanted trash that may harbor rodents or waste that is visible to the public.

What is seen most that are illegally dumped are mattresses, furniture and appliances.

The community clean-up saves residents money from having to drive to the dump.

"It's saving gas and fees associated with certain items that need to be dumped and provides a convenience of not having to go so far out of town," Gonzalez said.

To people that illegally dump, Gonzalez would like to remind them that when one does so, it becomes someone else's property.

"It becomes someone else's prob-

lem, and someone has to take the time and effort to throw it away where that time could be used to do something better." The community is also invited

to organize their own neighborhood unteers," Gonzalez clean-ups, and supplies like gloves, trash bags, vests and handheld trash grabbers can be provided. "The city has equipment and re-

> sources to help with any local community clean-up to collect trash or clean up graffiti," Gonzalez said.





eternal, and unchangeable, this gift of being our God can overshadow a lot of the other things we care about.
