A tragedy remembered

Garza family lost 4, and 'it's still hard'

March 25 is fast approaching, and with that date comes painful memories for a local family.

That was the day the Adam Garza family lost four of their own in a head-on collision. The other driver had alcohol in her system and also died at the scene.

Along with husband and father Adam, two of his children with first wife Amber died that day, Madelyn and Kaleb Garza. Jacqueline Garza lost her husband and their youngest daughter, Jordan.

For these families, the children will always remain youngsters as they watch the surviving children grow and experience life maneuvering through the pain of the death of siblings and continue on as young adults.

Maria Gomez is Jacqueline's sister and wanted to be there for her during an interview last week. "It's still hard for her," Gomez said.

The family has remained close since the accident. In fact, Morales threw a donation dinner in honor of her son, Kaleb, who would have turned 18 this year. The dinner collected enough donations to provide three \$500 scholarships in Kaleb's name at graduation this year. Jacqueline Garza donated raffle baskets for the dinner and helped with the party.

Additionally, Morales's son, Ethan Garza, spent months in the hospital after the accident recovering from his injuries. He continues to receive therapy. Morales is a firm believer in CBD oil and believes in its healing abilities.

Adam's oldest son, Arnold, along with Arnold's sister, Alicia, visited Jacqueline Garza the evening of the interview. Both attended the party that Morales threw for Kaleb Garza. In fact both families came together for that evening and were able to feel like they were giving back to a community that embraced their family in the time of tragedy.

"Some of our friends still dream about Jordan," Gomez said.

Gomez said that Jacqueline's oldest daughter, Marissa, was always there for her mom during this time.

"The community really came forward for the family," Jacqueline Garza said. "Jordan's friends still come over and visit to just sit in her room. I still have phone messages when she called me on my cell phone."

Store full of surprises

When you walk into Wasco Glass on Highway 46, you'll notice this isn't any ordinary glass shop. There are no mirrors, shower doors or framed windows on display inside the office; instead, you'll find a huge collection of sports memorabilia.

John Eric Schroeder -- he goes by Eric -- enthusiastically greets his customers as they enter his shop. His father, John Felix Schroeder, purchased the property in 1975 from the Fannin family and sold it to his son.

"This location was always a gas station even after my father purchased it in 1975," Schroeder said. "We sold gas as well as glass until 1993."

Since then, Schroeder said that it's been a glass shop exclusively. He stated that his father started collecting memorabilia when he was a child and that love of collecting was passed down to him.

While in college, Schroeder also wrote sports articles for the old *Wasco News*. He worked for Dennis Cutbirth, who currently lives in Santa Barbara. Among some of his collectibles, Schroeder has a copy of the 50th Anniversary Golden Jubilee issue of the paper.

Schroeder is proud of his family history. His family moved to Wasco in 1960 and he graduated from Wasco High School in 1977. He shared his 1977 yearbook photos along with several family photos on the wall of the shop.

Schroeder does all kinds of glass work, including repairs, installation of new windows, creates special windows and replaces single-pane windows with dual-pane



Wasco sending student to state contest

Wasco Union Elementary School District is sending seventh-grader Madison Martinez to the state History Day finals in Rocklin in May.

Madison Martinez's presentation was about Sacagawea, the only woman to travel with the Lewis & Clark expedition. She traveled with the explorers and showed them the way to their destination and back home to Wyoming.

Madison was visibly shaken as her name was announced as Champion for Individual Exhibit. Between shaking and tears of joy, she said, "Without Sacagawea, Lewis & Clark would not have found America or been able to return to Wyoming. She traveled with Lewis & Clark from the Northern Plains, through the Rocky Mountains, to the Pacific Ocean and back. Sacagawea made an impact on women."

According to Martinez's report, Sacagawea has disappeared from history books, a forgotten and unknown person.

There is no information on how, when or where she died.

She also mentioned that during the entire trip, Sacagawea guided the men to their destination and assisted them in communicating with the Indians, and that before America could expand all its unchartered territory obtained in the Louisiana Purchase, it had to be explored. Sacagawea was only 17 years old and pregnant with her first child when she embarked on the journey.

In addition to Madison earning a Champion title, seventh-grader Emilee Garza earned an honorable mention and was recognized for her individual performance of Sojourner Truth (an African-American women's rights activist who was born into slavery in New York and escaped with her infant daughter to freedom in 1926).

Saturday was a long day for all the students since they arrived at the Larry Reider Education Center in downtown Bakersfield at 8 a.m. with either their speeches memorized or their project in hand.

Students returned to the building after lunch in case spectators had any questions to ask about their projects.

The WUESD students had a variety of topics on display, such as "The War at Home, Divisions in America on the Vietnam War" by eighth-graders Nadia Ornelas, Liliana Valdez and Alexis Garcia. This project told the story of what was happening in the United States while Vietnam was being fought. How television had a great impact on society's view of the war and the conflicts that were occurring in the United States such as the riots on college campuses.

Another presentation, "The Salem Witch Trials," was created by eighth-grader Alyssa Maldonado, which told the story of innocent women being accused of witchcraft for unknown and random events, presented by Fernando Lopez and Javier Medina, which told the story of David Koresh and the dangerous religious cult he created in Waco, Texas, and the FBI's killing of most of the people living on the compound.

Earlier in the day, the students were given a tour of Wasco.

"I just moved to Wasco from Sacramento," Christopher Lopez said. "I learned a lot today about the important jobs like the animal shelter." Lopez said that he loved being here.

In other business, the council unanimously approved the purchase of a zero-emissions bus for \$53,145.

Resident Rafael Castro commented on the homeless living on a large mound of dirt behind the Carl Jr's Restaurant on Highway 46. He added that he felt the number of homeless people has grown in the city.

Additionally, the City Council voted to es-

This is expected to speed up the process of illegal dumpers being cited.

PASTOR'S CORNER

Life begins at end of your comfort zone

Do you long for a comfort zone? Nido R. Qubein says in his little book "Attitude: the remarkable Power of Optimism" that a comfort zone is a place to rest, to be safe and a place to be comforted and coddled. Sounds like a nice enough place to be doesn't it? However, think about it -- does that sound like a place where a person can grow, strive and change his world? Of course not; rather, it sounds like a nursery, a place full of infants but not for those who desire to change their little corner of the universe or beyond.

What causes us to shrink and slink away to a place of comfort and coddling? What is it in us that seems to sing along with Eddy Arnold as he sang years ago, "Make the world go away and get it off my shoulders"? Is it fear, uncertainty of what

is around the next corner or just plain laziness? We see shows like "Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous" and think wouldn't that life style be nice, all the while thinking they must just live in the lap of luxury without a care in the world, when in truth if their lives were examined we would find that to reach the pinnacle to which they have achieved that there were years and years of *no more comfort zones!*

Mr. Qubein goes on to say that comfort zones are like caves with four distinct attributes:

- Their darkness makes it hard to see.
- Their stagnant air grows stale and becomes hard to breathe.
- Their walls box us in.
- Their low ceilings keep us from stretching to our full height.

It is only when we examine our lives with full use of our fertile minds and a reen-

ergizing of our dormant pioneer spirits that we will be able to shake loose of the impotent design of life's nurseries and plunge head long into the fray known as life. It is only when we are creative within ourselves and willing to stretch beyond what others might say is futile, that we will soar live the admonition of the prophet Isaiah, "...they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint."

It is only when we kick loose of the chains that bind and throw back the "fuzzy" blanket of tranquility that we will be able to reach the heights to which we have been called -- to do, to create or to build. Will it always feel good, no, will it always be comfortable, heavens no, nor will it always be safe -- *but it will be exhilarating, freeing and fulfilling.* We will shout what the Apostle Paul wrote to the Church at Philip-

pi, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." (Philippians 4:13)

Think about this as it applies to freeing oneself from the confines of a comfort zone. 

windows. "Dual-pane windows are more energy efficient," he said.

Schroeder graduated from California State University, Bakersfield in communications, with a minor in English, because his mother was an English teacher. He worked for several television stations in Bakersfield, and knew in order to move up in the broadcasting business, he would have to relocate to a larger market. "I chose to stay in Wasco because my family didn't want to move," Schroeder said.

He was employed at the glass shop while in high school and college, and enjoyed working closely with his father. "I learned everything I know from him," Schroeder

said.

Schroeder's wife, Nanette, is a traveling nurse, and he met her in Colorado Springs.

Wasco Glass is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. They are closed on weekends and holidays

Pricing on windows is varied depending on the size of the window and whether or not the customer is switching from single-pane to double-pane windows.

"The busiest time of the year is August through October, when almond harvesting takes place," Schroeder said. "The almond sweeper windows are broken by tree branches, and we service agricultural customers from the farms in Shafter and Wasco during that time."

What does 'waste' mean to you?

When most people hear the word "waste," they think of garbage, trash, landfill, discarded, what we throw away and don't need. It is the last step in a very long process from manufacturing, transport, retail, to consumer, to home, to use, to not needed and discarded. Many people, products and resources are used in everything we buy. Just think of the worldly things that are available to us when we walk into a store. As you back out of your "waste," did you really need to create what you did? Did you plan ahead for all the things you were going to waste?

Waste, as in being "waste full"

When you are dishing up your plate of food at a buffet, you are most likely really hungry. As you pass through the line, you see one item, then another and another, stacking your plate until it resembles a pyramid of food that is waddled through. Have you ever stopped halfway through that line and contemplated, "Am I really going to eat all this?" Or is your mind consumed with hunger and getting your money's worth? How much did you actually eat and how much did you throw away when you came

to the end of that meal?

When you fill a glass of milk all the way to the top, is it out of habit to fill an empty item or did you really want all that milk? Did you drink it all or throw it down the drain? Can we retrain ourselves to only take what we need? Can we stop ourselves and change our habits to examine what we are actually going to use and train ourselves to take just what we need?

Waste as in one use

A good example is single-use plastic. A single-use plastic item is something you know you will only use one time and then discard it. It can be a plastic bag for some, a wrapper on an item we are buying, drink container, etc. What about when we are in a rush to grab a meal on the go? How much waste do we generate?

Take for example a salad to go. It probably has a fork wrapped in plastic that is discarded and a salad dressing wrapper that is thrown away. In addition, there is the container. How many items of plastic trash did that make? Could we have done something to be proactive and maybe packed a salad in reusable containers and not generated

all that single-use plastic which we discarded?

Do I get a new plastic water bottle every day and throw it away, or do I bring a useable one? When we are at the store, do we buy for convenience or what we plan to throw away? Most of us buy out of convenience, but what if in that moment, we thought about the end results of our actions. Think backward from our waste. If we buy in bulk, can we use reusable containers that would serve the same purpose as the exact same item in 30 prepackaged items, plus the outside package?

The latest Cal Recycle 1383 study shows that two-thirds of our waste stream is organic materials. NRDC studies show that 40 percent of the food we buy, we throw away.

With National Sword and its ban on plastics going to China, what can we do with all the single use plastic we generate? Most of our single-use plastic does not have a "home," so it's going into our landfills. As we trend into this new market of waste, we

need to reevaluate what we buy. Stop and ask ourselves, "Is this something that can be made into something else again? How many times will I use this item before I discard it? Is there a better choice when I am at the store of what I am buying? When I get take out, is it in a Styrofoam container that will take 500 years to decompose or is it a cardboard container that can be sent to compost with my food waste?"

The time has come that each of us needs to look backward from the waste -- a look into what am I producing or using and the results of my single action. One small step forward to changing our mindsets and habits will yield big results that affect all of us.
