There is a new artist with work on display at the Shafter Library. Iva Cross Fendrick has been creating art for decades and has also lent her expertise to students at various studios.

Fendrick has worked in a variety of mediums and subject matter. Her mediums include portraits in pencil and pastels, nude figure studies, sculpted figures and abstracts in mixed media. Her latest art adventure is plein air – the art of painting in the outdoors, with the subject in plain view, such as landscapes or subjects with movement in the work.

Fendrick is the daughter of Vina Cross,

who was one of the Bakersfield Art Association's founding members. Iva is also a fourth generation Kern County resident.

She earned a bachelors degree in art from Cal State Bakersfield, having also studied at Bakersfield College and the Art Center School of Design in Los Angeles. She studied ceramics with Vic Bracke of Central California and at the Mendocino Art Center. For 25 years, Fendrick taught in the Kern High School District, much of the time teaching ceramics.

Artistic expression has always been part of her life, from drawing quick sketches to creating water features for that quiet garden spot. Fendrick feels that the "artist

eye" is always at work. "When I see the soft shadows on the rolling hill sides, I long to capture that mood on paper for others to enjoy."

check on their progress when they noticed a deep need for essential items.

"We were a group of moms who know how challenging school is and what it takes to thrive in that environment," she said. "I grew up and didn't have a lot of money. I would have loved to have a Shafter High shirt, or sweater or something, but we didn't have the money. I know what it is like for some of these families who are struggling."

Young said that she and the other teachers started purchasing some items themselves to give to those in need. As they saw the need growing, they decided that the problem was bigger than what they could do by themselves. This grew into a program that helps hundreds of students a year, and has the support of several groups in Shafter, such as the Shafter Womans Club, Shafter Rotary and Shafter Kiwanis.

Lynnda Martin, of American Refuse, has helped the group with a couple of C-Trains that they can store items they are collected. They now have a couple of drives throughout the year, as well as be-

ing open all year round for individuals and businesses who would like to donate.

to memory. The intermediate and advanced divisions take on an even greater challenge, memorizing 419 verses. This feat is achieved through hours of daily study, prayer and rigorous practice sessions, culminating in monthly state competitions.

The structure of Bible quizzing is as intricate as the scriptures themselves. Participants are tested on their comprehension of memorized verses, facing an array

of questions that range from direct quotations to cross-referencing puzzles. The pursuit of excellence led the Truth Church Bible Quizzing Team to secure victory in two out of seven state tournaments, clinching second place in the remainder. Their journey culminated in a resounding victory at the Western Division's California State Championships. The Shafter team embarked on their national journey to Tulsa. Undeterred by the formidable opponents that awaited them, the team's determination shone through as they navigated through the tournament bracket. Despite facing setbacks, they rebounded with an unwavering resolve that carried them to the brink of triumph.

The team's progress to the championship round was nothing short of astonishing. Each match unfolded with nailbiting suspense, often coming down to the final question. Under the captaincy of Delainey Wofford, the team advanced to the championship clash against Buford, Georgia. The tournament became a living embodiment of the Cinderella story, a testament to the power of faith and perseverance.

In the end, the team fell just shy of the ultimate victory, losing to Buford, Georgia. Nevertheless, their journey to the runnerup position at the National Tournament was nothing short of triumphant. Cabrera said that a quote from Muhammad Ali came to mind, "We are going to shock the world!" and these kids sure did.

Other outstanding accomplishments include Delaney Wofford not only earning the 2nd highest individual scorer of the National Tournament, but was also named Quizzer of the Year at both the State and National levels. Pastor Frank Cabrera was named Runner-Up Coach of the Year. Alayna Cabrera's combined Bakersfield / Shafter team placed 3rd in the Junior Division at the National Tournament, and Alayna earned several individual medals.

In January 2024, Truth Church Shafter will be hosting the State Novice Tournament for beginning quizzers in every division. 

### **PASTORS CORNER** Wisely handling anger

There were once two brothers, one a shepherd and the other a farmer. One day they gave gifts to their father. The shepherd son gave the best sheep of his flock, while the farmer son thoughtlessly gave low-quality vegetables. The father was delighted with the best sheep but was displeased with the poor produce. The farmer's son was very angry at his brother for one-upping his gift. These feelings boiled over into rage, and one day the angry son murdered his brother! This is a retelling of Cain's anger and murder of Abel (Genesis 4:1-8). It shows one of the most powerful and potentially destructive emotions with its consequences: sinful anger.

Anger is a strong feeling of displeasure or hostility brought on by frustrations or annoyances. Someone wrongs you? Now you are angry. The Bible has much wise counsel for those prone to anger and controlling it. "Do not be quickly provoked in your spirit, for anger resides in the lap of fools." Ecclesiastes 7:9. The wise Christian knows how to control and calm anger and to make peace by righteous methods.

Anger is a powerful force, an intense emotion that can suddenly erupt (Proverbs 27:4a; Galatians 5:20; Ephesians 4:31). Learning how to control and calm anger wisely by God's Word is immeasurably valuable. Knowing the consequences of anger also helps the wise Christian control or avoid anger and make peace with others (Proverbs 14:17). Anger will lead you to play the fool as your angry actions will bring shame and regret later (15:18). Anger will stir up more conflict, and it is not wise to associate with the chronically angry (22:24). Every person who expresses sinful anger says harmful words and

does harmful actions. The wise Christian seeks to avoid these consequences.

There is such a thing as righteous anger. Jesus was angry at the corrupt money changers and drove them out of the temple (Matthew 21:12-13). Righteous anger is against specific sin that can be supported by Scripture (Exodus 20:1-17). The methods you use to express your anger must be righteous. Vengeance, reprisals, harsh words, and evil actions because one has been wronged by another sinner are not righteous (Galatians 5:19-21). Christians first appeal to God concerning wrongs suffered (Romans 12:19-21). Christians seek to quell anger in his or her own heart by love, forgiveness, or personally making peace (Matthew 5:9; Eph 4:32). Christians should appeal to the proper authorities (police, courts, authorities; Romans 13:1-7).

Peace is a great reward to someone who

learns to control their temper and is slow to anger (Matthew 5:9; Romans 12:18; James 3:18). Sinful anger will only cause destruction, therefore the one who controls anger effectively is more likely to have a constructive and successful life (Proverbs 15:18; 16:32a; 19:11; James 1:19). Even if there is a reason for righteous anger, the grace of Christ shines in the life of the Christian who wisely overlooks and forgives an offense quickly (Proverbs 19:11). The reward for letting anger go is a greater testimony to others for Christ, rather than winning every battle and receiving recompense from every wrong suffered. The wise Christian understands anger, controls it, calms it and seeks reap the rewards of peace (Matthew 5:21-26).

"Everyone must be quick to hear, slow to speak and slow to anger; for the anger of man does not achieve the righteousness of God.~ *James* 1:19b-20.
