A packed stadium for TJ ceremonies

Thomas Jefferson Middle School was the first of three Wasco schools to hold its annual graduation ceremony on May 23 at 7 p.m. on the football field. Wasco High School's football field began filling up at least an hour before beginning its eighth-grade graduation ceremony for 323 students. Cars lined nearby streets and filled the high school parking lots as swarms of people entered the gates for the ceremony. Both sides of the bleachers were filled.

Telling the graduates her best advice was to "work hard and do the very best that you can," Superintendent Lori Albrecht had all the students graduating with an associate degree from Bakersfield College along with their high school diploma stand and be recognized for their hard work and dedication.

The first student speaker was Valedictorian Veronica Garcia, who recommended to her classmates that they continue to work hard, saying "We worked hard for all we got."

Salutatorian Christian Figueroa, recipient of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation Scholarship, also addressed his classmates and shared that each would fail at something in life, but everyone can overcome their failures and become successful. His speech projected a tough reality for all, but in the end, there would be success. In other words, life is


tough but hard work will persevere.

Animal shelter in need of help, staff says

Insufficient staff, limited resources and outdated facilities continue to discourage the animal shelter's ability to function well, the City Council was told Tuesday night.

Public Works Director Biridiana Bishop and Marco Silva presented concerns to the council regarding deteriorating animal con-

trol services.

Silva explained how the current kenneling facilities endanger the animals and people who come to visit. "We do the best with what we go t... but a lot of times the dogs chew right through the fence," he said.

He described how many of the walkways do not meet the Americans With Disabilities Act regulations. The main space

where visitors roam to meet the dogs often collects several inches of drain-off consisting of water, urine and feces from the kennels. "We got kids [come in] and we always have to tell them 'Hey, don't step here, it isn't safe,'" he said.

Only 175 dogs were adopted last year, of the 2,275 dogs processed.

Wasco's shelter charges considerably

greater licensing and adoption fees than other towns, such as Delano and Shafter. Locals adopt out-of-town rather than pay the heavy fees, Bishop said.

The council expressed interest in looking into methods of increasing Animal Control Services' effectiveness, and requested that the representatives of the shel-

"Three years ago, I couldn't read, write or speak English," Aguayo said. "I went to school to learn."


Aguayo's message to his classmates was to never give up and never let anyone tell you that you won't make it. "Never forget your friends," he added.

Principal Martin Lonza addressing the graduates.





A place for everyone at Planet Dance

Small family businesses are everywhere in Wasco. Some have been around for several years, such as Jerry's Pet Feed and Blue Sushi, while others are new to the area, such as Delicias Sinaloenses Ice Cream Shop and Sweet 7th Street Cookies and Cupcakes.

Planet Dance, at 641 F St., has been around since 2002 and is gearing up for its Mid-Year Gala on Saturday, June 22.

The owner of Planet Dance is Corine Matera, who also owns Planet Dance Boutique in Bakersfield at 4909 Stockdale Highway.

Matera's daughter, Jill Jimenez, and son, Jacob Hernandez, both run the

studio in Wasco while their mother runs the boutique.

Jimenez has a history of performing, as she was a cheerleader for Lincoln High School in San Jose, Calif., cheered at San Jose State and participated in dance programs. She has two boys who participate on traveling sports teams.

"My boys travel all year long," she said.

"We feel that dance can be for everyone," Jimenez added. "No one should be turned away."

Jimenez pointed out that Planet Dance accepted a special needs student when other dance studios rejected her.

"We were the only studio around where a mother with a special needs daughter could sign her up for classes," Jimenez said. "She

tried to enroll her daughter at several dance studios in Bakersfield and was told no at each one. This student is going on her second year at Planet Dance."

Jimenez added that the studio has four teachers. Miss Veronica and Miss

Vickie are two of the dance teachers at the studio, along with Jimenez and Hernandez.

Jimenez said Jacob teaches all the tap classes, the combination classes (for younger students) as well as performing arts classes and

hip hop level 2 and 3.

"I teach ballet from ages 1 to 4, beginning jazz 1 and 2, and beginning hip hop," she said. "All the teachers collaborate on the competition routines."

The dancers compete at KAR, Radix, Hollywood Vibe and Velocity competitions, and they have traveled to Las Vegas to compete.

Planet Dance is a family run business that, so far, has done well in the Wasco community with a total of 120 students.

"My mom's vision was to open up year round," Jimenez said. "Once we had our Christmas recital, we wanted to showcase our students' talents mid-year, so we created the Mid-Year Gala."

For this event, the dancers are able to create their own costumes to go with the theme of their music instead of having to purchase

a new one.

Jimenez says the family tries to keep costs down for families. Tuition at Planet Dance hasn't changed much since the school started. When it opened, tuition was \$40 a month, and it was recently raised to \$50 a month.

Costumes have always been \$125. "My mother insists we keep the costume prices the same since we began," Jimenez said.

Both Hernandez and Jimenez have careers outside of their passion. "Real life costs more than what dancing pays," Jimenez said, "so my brother is a cosmetologist and I'm a counselor."

Jimenez said her brother does a lot of freelancing, photo shoots and weddings.

Planet Dance is open Monday through Thursday from 4 to 9 p. m.

The event concluded with a free lunch for everyone, and 18 bikes were raffled off.


"The Bike Rodeo has turned into a great way for Code Compliance to reach the community, and the community definitely enjoys the rodeo," Gonzalez said.


Principal Tallon told the graduates, "If you can't run, walk, whatever you do, keep moving forward."

Principal of TJMS Danny Arellano presented the Class of 2019 to the attendees by name.


Arellano told the graduates he was grateful for the support and incredible commitment parents, students and staff.
