



City Council awards grant for festival

At the City Council meeting on Tuesday, a grant application submitted by the Orange Heart Foundation requesting \$2,000 in funds for the Wasco Rose Festival event On May 7, 2019, the City Council ad-

opted a resolution approving a \$10,000 Community Grant Program to be given by the City Council to qualifying non-profit organizations within city limits. There is a \$2,000 limit that a non-profit group may Mayor Gilberto Reyna said that the

Council recognizes that citizens have the right to expect public funds and public resources to be used in a justifiable and fair manner and that the groups requesting public funds are financially responsible and ac-

Further, the Council and staff put in place many checks and balances to ensure the groups use the money awarded by the Council to benefit the community.

According to a staff report, the City Council recognizes the many benefits that various groups, organizations, volunteers and events within the City of Wasco provide by promoting and improving the City's cultural, social and economic well-being.

The Shafter City Council approved procedures that will be used to fill two open seats on the Planning Commission. The council will invite residents to sub-

mit a letter of interest, then will interview the candidates at a council meeting. The council will then cast ballots, with the two highest vote-getters filling the open seats. The council also heard a presentation

from the Latino Coalition for a Healthy California. Paola Ilescas and other members of the coalition talked about activities that have been undertaken at Mannel Park to make improvements. They have held clean-up events and discussed the possibility of installing bike racks at the park, as Ilescas said that Mannel Park has been

a beacon for the other communities around the valley, with the installation of the outdoor gym and different activities related to healthy choices for the community. In other council action, a one-time ex-

penditure of \$77,000 was approved for a patrol vehicle that will be utilized by the Richland schools' resource officer from the Shafter Police Department. During public comment, Jeff Martin

from American Refuse updated the council

on the progress of the 3-cart system rollout for the city.

Martin said that the majority of the community has done a wonderful job in following procedures using the new system, and they have had to tag only a few cans that were in violation of the sorting

Martin said that it will take a little time for the system to get fully operational and is very pleased with the progress made so far.

Wasco Glass will celebrate 47 years in business next month. Since its inception, Wasco Glass has served the community with much love and dedication.

Owner Eric Schroeder manages the business by himself, running the day-today operations and handling all of his many accounts. It is a family-owned business launched by his father in 1975, when Schroeder was a sophomore at Wasco High

and enjoys working with the community.

for 18 years," said Schroeder.

In 1993, they decided to run the business exclusively as a glass company.

The Schroeder family has a long history in Wasco dating back to the early 1900s. His father is one of 10 children, all born in Wasco. His mother was an administrator, librarian and English teacher at Wasco High School for 31 years.

Schroeder said he loves Wasco and enjoys having the business here. He lives four blocks from the shop.

"I like the small town feel and the people. Wasco has been good to the Schroeder family and the glass shop." Schroeder has an eclectic background,


having graduated from Cal State Bakersfield in 1984 with a major in communications and a minor in English. After graduating, he worked for the Wasco News.

"I wrote sports articles. In 1985, I went to Wimbleton and had a three-page article with photos from the trip."

He also worked for channels 29, 23 and 17, where he spent seven years in that field.

There were opportunities for him to continue his television career in a larger market, but that would have required him to move his wife and three children away from Kern County. "I had a chance to get involved in the

family business and decided to stay here. It was a 180% degree change." He said he

couldn't have been happier with the move. Since then, he has built a popular and

profitable business working with residential, commercial and auto glass. He provides many services, handling

just about everything glass related. "What don't I do here?" he says.

It is the only glass shop in the Wasco area, and some of his biggest clients are from the farm industry, including accounts with Wonderful Orchards and South Valley His busiest time is during harvest season

in August, September and October. "Windows break when the farm equip-

ment goes through the fields. Branches swing back and break the glass.' Customer service is very important to

"I bend over backwards for my customers working after hours and on weekends. We've been here for almost 47 years. That

says something about my business." He says his prices are very competitive.

"I did a job in Shafter for a farm company replacing a dual pane window and charged them \$295. They called a company in Bakersfield that would have charged them \$795 for the same window," Schroeder said.

Schroeder plans to retire in three years, along with his wife, where he will spend his time traveling with her. When he leaves, he hopes it will continue to be a glass business because Wasco needs it. Wasco Glass, 1311 Highway 46, is open

The abundant life: Feasting at the King's table

Jesus said, "I have come that they may have life, and that they may have it more abundantly." (John 10:10b) Yet many Christians have lives that are anything but blessed, flourishing and abundant. They live below the level of blessing Jesus promised. They live with lack, sometimes financial lack, but more often a spiritual and emotional lack of love, joy and hope. There is a story in Samuel 9 of a young

prince, who in spite of his royal blood, lived with lack. He was the grandson of Israel's first king, Saul. Unfortunately, after his father and grandfather died in battle, his nanny was so afraid that his life was in danger that as she panicked and ran with the small prince, she dropped him (2 Samuel 4:4). He sustained injuries that left him unable



to walk. As he grew, that same fear that his life was in danger, left him living in a place called Lo-debar, whose very name means isolation and lack.

The new king, King David, had sworn to his best friend Jonathan, the prince's father. that he would protect and bless Jonathan's descendants (1 Samuel 20:14-15). So he began to search for Jonathan's children so he could keep his promise. When he found the prince, he immediately restored all his lands and wealth, and then invited him to eat at the royal table for the rest of his life. The interesting thing is that the prince

no longer thought of himself as a prince. His response to King David's generosity was to ask, "Why would you bother with a dead dog like me?" He didn't feel worthy of being blessed. His hard life had left him feeling like nothing and nobody.

Sadly, the same thing happens to some of God's children. Sometimes the hard knocks of life have hurt them deeply, and the damage leaves them feeling helpless and hopeless. The fear of being hurt again has made them isolate themselves and live a life of lack, not abundance.

Fortunately, the King always comes looking for them, ready to restore what has been taken from them and to invite them to feast at His table where He can provide for their every need, and they can enjoy His presence. He is eager to see them live in abundance, but sometimes they, like the young prince, feel unworthy and distrustful of His generosity.

The young prince struggled to trust too, but the Bible tells us that he ended up feasting at the king's table for the rest of his life. What is more, when someone tried to cheat him out of his wealth, his response was, "Let him have it all." The prince had discovered that the best blessing of his life was spending time with the king and trusting him to meet his needs each day. Let's learn from his example.
