Amazon to open Distribution Center in Shafter

Amazon is opening a distribution center in Shafter, making it the second Amazon facility to open in Kern County.

The new center will be in the Wonderful Industrial Park and is expected to open later this year, bringing 1,000 jobs to the area. Amazon opened a facility in Bakersfield

"Amazon is excited to make this investment in Kern County that will support local economic development and help us deliver to our growing number of customers in the region. As we continue to grow in California, we are contributing to the economic recovery in the Southern California

and across the state," said Jordan Nelson, director of Regional Operations for Ama-

The distribution centers are responsible for sorting, packaging and shipping

The center will be over 1 million square feet and bring around 1,000 jobs with a starting salary of \$15 an hour. Amazon officials have not said how many of the jobs will be full time and how many will be part time. Full-time positions include benefit packages. Amazon will also be hiring for roles in human resources, operations man-

Kern Ag commissioner, state department at impasse

Negotiations about pesticide notifications between the Kern Ag commissioner and the state Department of SHAFTER

Regulation have broken down.

Kern Ag Commissioner Glen Fankhauser recently wrote a letter to the state that he would not comply with Director Val Docini's request to give the community advanced notification of when and where farmers plan to spray pesticides deemed particularly dangerous.

When AB617 passed in 2017, a steering committee was formed in Shafter to develop a plan to reduce emissions in the air. Made up of city officials, business owners and concerned citizens, the group has met monthly for over a year.

In December of 2019, the group turned over its plan to the California Air Resources Board for approval.

Then the pandemic hit, slowing the implementation of many items on the plan. According to Shafter



The steering committee was formed to help reduce emissions and improve air quality.

Mayor Cathy Prout, a member of the steering committee, there have been improvements made in efforts to reduce emissions.

"There is a plan in place to plant

groups of trees, which will help the air quality," Prout said. "There are also plans and programs in place to help farmers change their equip-

Kern County nears red tier

The region has seen a decrease in the amount of new coronavirus cases this past week, giving Kern County hope for a cautious return to the red tier in the near fu-

REGIONAL As of Tuesday, Feb.

23, Kern County Public Health Director Brynn Carrigan told the Board of Supervisors at its morning meeting that "the state will announce today that the county has an unadjusted covid-19 case rate of 16.8 per 100,000 people with a state-adjusted rate, closer to 18.5 and the county is inching closer to the red tier.

The red tier is a less restricted tier, which allows schools to begin letting students in along with indoor dining as well as the reopening of gyms.

Football and winter sports were expected to begin playing by the end of January, yet, that hasn't happened

Comments from administrators of both school districts have stated in the past that it's difficult to determine exactly where each district stands because the numbers change every day and some school districts predict a return to school by April 2021 while others maintain that school will not

resume until fall 2021 for everyone. According to Shafter High Principal Russell Shipley, the wait is frustrating but the district is being careful to make sure that the students and staff are safe and healthy

throughout the process. Cross country meets in the Wasco Union High School

Garcia selected as mayor for second term

Mayor Alex Garcia has been appointed to serve a second term.

When Garcia was interviewed about two years ago, he stated that he felt the position of mayor should be more than just a one-year term. He often commented that "It would be nice if the mayor could serve two years instead of one because it takes almost a year to get your feet wet in the leadership position.'

Garcia said that he feels like he has had

a two-year term being selected mayor once again so close to his last term.

"Alex cares deeply about the City of Wasco," council member Vince Martinez said. "I felt it was important to have a wellspoken, experienced leader to help guide our city through these difficult times. Alex and I do not agree on every issue, but I have always found him to be willing to listen and make decisions he feels are best for the City of Wasco."

Martinez also said that he feels Garcia's willingness to listen and consider the input of those who don't agree with him to be a quality of a strong leader.

Council member John Pallares also said that he voted for Garcia because he has experience.

Garcia is a hometown young man who graduated from Wasco High School in 2007. He was involved in Future Farmers of America in school and served as an officer at both the local chapter and sectional levels. He ran for a state FFA officer position, but lost that.

"That's when I got my first taste of politics," Garcia said.

After graduation, Garcia attended Fresno State, where he spent time during the summers as a volunteer, registering voters in rural communities within Fresno County.

Upon graduation, he relocated to Las Vegas and worked on the Obama 2012 reelection campaign.

His political experiences had him walking the streets, putting up signs, addressing



Members of St. John's say goodbye to Father Sanchez-Flores

Father Raul A. Sanchez-Flores has been relocated to St. Joseph's Church in Selma. Sanchez-Flores joined St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church six years ago

as parish priest.

When asking Sanchez-Flores whether or not he had a choice in accepting a new assignment, he said when a parish priest is asked to change locations, the priest usually agrees to the move. "On Tuesday Feb. 19, I received a phone

call from Father Sal Gonzalez, Vicar General, who was calling on behalf of our bishop, Most Reverend Joseph V. Brennan, D.D," Sanchez-Flores said. "After a brief greeting, Father Sal told me: Bishop Joe wants you to take care of St. Joseph, Selma. I was in shock for a few seconds and I asked: 'Can I think about it?' However, I remembered that we owe obedience to our bishop and after a minute I said: 'How can I say no to our bishop. I feel honored he trusts me at St Joseph's in Selma.""

Sanchez-Flores said that he was unable to tell anyone about his reassignment until he received a letter from Bishop Joseph V. Brennan to make it official.

"I want everybody to know that it was very sad for me to leave. My six and onehalf years at St. John the Evangelist, Wasco was a great learning experience," he said. "On July 2014 Wasco began as an assignment but with time it became a family and Sanchez-Flores added that he often re-

ceived compliments from both English and

Spanish-speaking parishioners that he had done a lot; however, the way he sees it, everyone did it together.

"I had the vision to work for the spiritual and material benefit of the parish and people believed in it," he added. "My favorite places to go that last few years were to Home Depot and True Value. There were always projects to be done." He feels at times that he didn't do

enough because there were some big projects he couldn't do. "A year ago I was planning to install

an air conditioner system for the parish hall," he said. "It was a \$120,000 project. A mechanical engineer was already working with the blueprint of the hall to make a decision on how to install the system. I am glad we did not start the project during the pandemic." Replacing Sanchez-Flores will be Father

Guillermo Preciado. "I don't doubt that he will do a great job

as the new spiritual guide," he said. Sanchez-Flores is familiar with the Sel-

ma area as his first assignment was as priest

at St. Anthony of Padua, Reedley. "During that time, I used to help Vigil Masses with Father Efrain Martinez, who

was the pastor those days," he said. He also said that he hopes to bring to St. Joseph's what he has learned from ministering the community of St. John's.

"My philosophy is that we can always improve ourselves. I was always proud and grateful of all volunteers sharing their time



and talent with the community," he said. "I know the St. Joseph community is hungry to work and fulfill a relationship with God through a sacramental life and work." Sanchez-Flores also added that he will

pray to his new patron St. Joseph, but also

to his beloved St. John the Evangelist for their intercession. "I am very grateful with residents of Wasco but also good friends from Shafter

and Delano," he said.

In addition, Sanchez-Flores asked that everyone pray for Preciado and himself so both, with the help of the community, do their part working for the communities trusted to their care.

"Finally, I am very grateful with our emeritus Bishop Ochoa for trusting me with St John's, Wasco six and a one-half years and with our current Bishop Joe for this new mission at St Joseph Selma," he St. John parishioner and Mayor Pro Tem

Gilberto Reyna said that Sanchez-Flores has been a great spiritual leader for the St. John parish.

"Shortly after arriving in our community, Father Raul attracted many more Catholic faithful to our church by celebrating a much-needed additional weekend Mass," Reyna said. "He provided opportunities for all parish groups to participate in the church and offered them spiritual guidance to help them grow in their faith. He made many improvements to the church building, moved a beautifully carved alter from the chapel to the nave and added a new tabernacle and wood paneling all around it."

Reyna also said that Sanchez-Flores installed window treatments and added the church's name to the steeple as well as new lighting to the building's exterior. "He made our church more beautiful,"

he added. "Through the generous donation of a parishioner, he installed new church bells. He also remodeled the Parish Hall and the old Convent building and moved the church offices to the latter.' Reyna also said that Sanchez-Flores had all the creative ideas that made the church

more parishioner-friendly and more beautiful and he was personally involved with all of the above undertakings, often making trips to get materials needed to complete the projects. "Learning of Father Raul's departure

from our parish saddens me," Reyna said. "I realize I'm not only saying goodbye to my spiritual pastor but my good friend. I wish him the best. I pray to God to guide Father Raul's steps in his new journey."

During the pandemic, bulky waste dropoff events were not held and more items were dumped illegally, said Shafter Public Works Director Michael James. The alleyways of Shafter can be popular

dumping grounds for unwanted mattresses, chairs, tires, that residents don't want to haul to the landfill, James said. When items are dumped illegally in the

alleys of a neighborhood, funds have to be taken out of the city's General Fund to cover the act of picking up the items and disposing of them properly.

'We don't have a crew that is designated to pick up illegally dumped items," said James. "We have been fortunate enough in the past to have American Refuse hold a couple of bulky waste events in Shafter that allows the residents to dispose of those items not considered regular trash, without a fee for the service. Unfortunately, a couple of the bulky waste events that were originally scheduled for last year had to be canceled due to the coronavirus issue."

James said that the state is implementing a Bill that will stop the use of barrel cans in

"Eventually, all residents will be given their own containers that they will be responsible for. We are hoping that this will help alleviate the issue of illegal dumping, with the absence of the big cans in the alleys," he said.

Vaccination center approved by district

The Recreation and Parks District has voted to allow the state to open the veteran's hall as a vaccination center.

The board voted to approve the center at a special meeting on Feb. 19.

Juan Bernal also provided a report at the regular meeting on Thursday, Feb. 18 on the district's research into the costs of construction of a new salt water swimming pool. The district is close to finalizing the grant application for the pool.

Board Chairman Sharon Sharp said since Wasco does not have a bowling alley, theater, or other activity outlets for residents, it's important that the district provide as much in activities as it can for all age groups. Sharp suggested a slogan for the district such as "Getting Moving Wasco."

The board members brainstormed on

being creative with different activities. Castillo emphasized that the parks are where social outlets are available for everyone and are big central locations in town.

Bernal then reported the current programs at the district are: Trailblazers (cross country) with 35 participants, girls' baseball, and a coach training program.

"The district is still working on getting coaches," he said.

Castillo added that she noticed a skate park was very popular at another park in the county and she said there were a lot of kids at the skate park. She said Wasco should consider a skate park

At the conclusion of the activity discussion,

Sharp reported that the fire extinguishers had all been updated. Additionally, she mentioned that the park lighting is almost completed.

"We need to spend more time on irrigation," she said. "The district is looking into

artificial turf.

Castillo then asked Chris to meet with the city to see if a joint venture could be reached between the Recreation and Parks District to share the cost of a part-time safety employee.

In other board business, Marin brought up changes that need to be made with the district manager job description. The board voted to change some of the wording of the description to read "Bachelor's degree preferred with a starting salary of \$80,000."

Due to the times we live in and covid-19 this has been what the industry calls a soft opening. Word of mouth is spreading and the iconic red train carriage with an indoor seating of 25 is open again from Tuesday through Saturday from 5 a.m. till 1 p.m. for takeout as well as breakfast and lunch dining. You might wish to call ahead for seating on Friday or Saturday. The Red Wagon Café can be reached at 661-630-2032.

The new owners are Matt and J.J. Hernandez and Elliot Meacham. The brothers were the cooks on our two visits. Matt got his training in Bakersfield, working his way up from line cook to a stint at Frugatti's as a chef. Their training and experience bode well for the success of the Red Wagon Café. We were greeted with smiles on our arrival and the general feeling was one of friendly openness.

My wife and I went to breakfast on a Wednesday and we each ordered the "Let's Build It" breakfast starting at \$11. It starts with a choice of five meats and eggs, I had scrambled and my wife over easy, we chose bacon (four thick cut slices) hash browns or our choice of country fried potatoes, and a choice of toast or biscuit and gravy. The por-

tions are generous and the ingredients are freshly prepared that morning. For drinks I had coffee and my wife water. The coffee is a special blend from a local producer made just for the Red Wagon Café and can be purchased separately for home use. It is a good hearty blend with a nice aroma. Service was quick and the food worth the price.

Our lunch visit was on Friday, Feb. 19 and we arrived a little after 11 a.m. The café was full but we were seated right away. I had the lunch special, a hot beef sandwich served with mashed potatoes and gravy and beans. My wife had a burger and a cup of clam chowder. Other options included a tri tip sandwich. My wife said the burger was the best she had tasted in quite a while. She also appreciated the plate with lettuce, tomatoes, onions and pickle slices on the

side still fresh on delivery. There is also an option of several types of cheeses for the burgers. To drink I had iced tea and my wife water. 

ment to more eco-friendly machines, improving the air quality as well."

Regarding the pesticide issue, Prout said that there had been a couple of plans submitted, but they didn't go far enough in notifying the public when spraying.

"There is a notification plan in place that has door knockers placed on homes in the area when certain pesticides are going to be sprayed," said Prout.

According to Fankhauser, the efforts the committee are making for being notified is unreasonable and he said that the information could also be used against the farmers by members of the committee who want to

eliminate spraying altogether. Fankhauser said there are other motives in play other than protecting the residents and giving them adequate notice before spraying.

There have been efforts by third-party mediators to help with the impasse, but those too broke down.

Shafter High graduate and former state Sen. Dean Florez, who now serves on the California Air Resources Board, attempted to mediate a resolution between the two parties, but his efforts lasted one meeting, after which he backed off of the situation.

Florez has not provided a reason for why he is no longer involved in the effort to resolve the situation.

Hall must weigh the decrease in revenues versus ever-increasing costs for maintenance, services and safety. Despite the challenges ahead, I'm confident our city


can meet the moment of the current health crisis."

District have been occurring, first with Wasco High vs. Bakersfield Christian and also Garces.

"We don't have an update yet on WUHSD sports," Superintendent Rob Cobb said on Monday.

In Shafter, the high school has to wait on word from the Kern High School District.

With Kern County still in the purple tier, the only sport that is ac-

ceptable for schools to participate in, according to the CIF, is cross country. Recently the Kern High School District Board decided that they would not OK schools to begin their cross country seasons, saying that the number of cases in the district are still too high to feel comfortable competing in a sports season.

That makes it unlikely that Kern High Schools will have any sports this year, unless Kern County does make it into the red tier. With a newly positioned place in the red tier, it would take Kern County schools at least two weeks to prepare for the seasons, giving the schools a narrow window in which to hold their seasons.

This past week, Wasco's number of positive covid-19 tests was up 45 cases for a total of 5,234 cases since the pandemic began.

In Shafter, total positive cases were up by 53 cases to a total of 3,398 cases.



In 2002 Hoot married Chris (Kuhn) Gibson, and the couple enjoyed the last 19 years together. He worked in agriculture for



who brought joy to the lives




