Man killed in 4th shooting since Dec.

A 23-year-old Wasco man was killed during a shooting on Feb. 20.

The shooting occurred in the 500 block of D Street at around 9:30 p.m. The Kern County Sheriff's Office was called to the scene for multiple reports of shots fired in the area.

Guillermo Leon was found suffering from multiple gunshot wounds. He was

pronounced dead by emergency responders. A postmortem examination will be conducted to confirm the cause and manner of death, deputies said.

There are no details regarding what led up to the shooting, and no suspect information was immediately available.

This homicide marks the fourth shoot-

ing in Wasco since December.

The most recent occurred on Feb. 16 in the 2400 block of Sharon Court. They found Christopher Aaron Regalado, 31, deceased due to a gunshot wound when law enforcement arrived.

On Feb. 9, a man was shot in the face during a failed robbery attempt near 8th and E Street. He was airlifted by helicopter to Kern Medical Center, but was later dis-

charged from the hospital.

Two men were shot in the 1500 block of G Street on Dec. 4. Guadalupe Chavez, 46, was pronounced dead at the scene and the other victim was treated and later released from Kern Medical Center.

Public hearing to be held for proposed trash rate

The City Council has set guidelines for residents to provide input on the proposed trash rate increase.

A public hearing regarding the city's proposed trash rate adjustments will occur on April 19. The council held a special meeting and approved a resolution to provide guidelines for submitting and tabulating protests in anticipation of this.

"The resolution was created specifically to avoid confusion with the council or the public as we navigate the protest process. The council is eager to follow the process to ensure the public has the maximum opportunity to have its views heard and considered. We also feel it is important that the public understands this action [to raise rates] is largely driven by State of California mandates, not the City of Wasco," said City Manager Scott Hurlbert.

With the resolution, guidelines were set to ensure that the public protest hearing is conducted in a way that permits every affected person to speak, submit testimony, and, if desired, a protest of the proposed rate adjustment. A process for receiving and counting the number of protests was also agreed upon.

Any person who wishes to protest or provide any information regarding the proposed rate increase must do so before the public hearing or during the public hearing, but before its conclusion.

Any customer of record who is subject to the proposed utility change may submit a written protest by mailing or delivering it in person to the City Clerk's office located at 746 8th St. Written protests can also be submitted during the

Mask mandate returns to pre-surge

As of Feb. 16, the state's masking mandate reverted back to pre-surge requirements and fully vaccinated people do not need to wear masks indoors. Unvaccinated people are required to mask in all indoor settings.

The state also recommended that fully vaccinated people continue masking indoors if the risk may be high.

Masks are required for all individuals in the following indoor public settings,

regardless of vaccination status: on public transit, indoors in K-12 schools, emergency shelters, health care settings, State and local correctional/detention centers, homeless shelters, and adult/senior care facilities.

"COVID is likely to be in Kern County for the near future, if not permanently," said Brynn Carrigan, Director of Kern County Public Health Services. "We need to learn to safely live with the presence of this dis-

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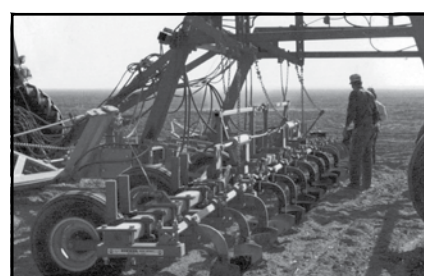

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LaCarne Meat Market, a cut above the rest

Even as you enter the LaCarne Meat Market, grabbing the handles made from meat cleavers, you know you are in for a different experience.

The meat market opened this past August.

Owner Hugo Garcia said one difference in his market is the high quality of meat that they provide to customers.

“Our meat is graded, and we use only Choice and Prime cuts of meat,” said Garcia.

Garcia also said this place is something that Shafter has needed for a long time, letting the residents experience a high quality cut of meat on their table.

“Some things you can cut corners on, or go the cheap route to save a little money, but when it comes to quality meat, it is worth the extra dollar to be able to enjoy a great steak, or other piece of meat,” he said.

Garcia is no stranger to the food business, starting the La Imperial Taco business

with his mother and sister just a few years ago. LaCarne supplies the meat to La Imperial Taco.

Garcia said that their ribeye steaks are very popular, as well as their Wagyu beef. Wagyu beef is set apart by its high grade and the fat in Wagyu melts in your mouth because of its lower melting temperature of its fat, resulting in a buttery, ultra rich flavor.

LaCarne also has a selection of sea food, with an array of shrimp and other fish.

The attention to detail is another thing that sets them apart from the rest, with the marbling of their meats, as well as the way the meat is butchered. Frank Duarte and Joe Navarro, who work at the market, have plenty of experience cutting meat.

“You usually have to go to a bigger city to get this grade of meat, usually settling for a cheaper, lower quality piece of meat,” said Garcia. “We pride ourselves in giving the community a chance to enjoy a big city meat experience in a small town setting.”

On Feb. 18, the Houchin Community Blood Bank, in partnership with the Knights of Columbus, brought their donor bus to Wasco.

“When I first donated, I found out I was O positive, which I learned was the most

years,” Danny Espitia, a 20-year member of the Knights of Columbus, said. “For me, it’s about saving lives and being a good Christian, honoring my God, my family, and my friends. Also, when I give blood, it is beneficial because as a male, donating has been linked to preventing prostate cancer.”

Many Wasco residents have been donating for years. Martiniano Sandoval has given 14 gallons of blood and is working on his 15th.

“It’s a piece of cake, and it makes me happy knowing that with each donation, I am impacting three lives,” Sandoval said. “I know that every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs blood.”

“All one needs to donate is a form of identification. When they arrive, donors are provided with general information and asked to fill out a basic questionnaire on a tablet. All of our educational materials and documents are translated into Spanish, so there is no language barrier,” said Houchin Community Blood Bank Account Manager Stephanie Pimentel.

“We try to make the event special and fun. The Knights of Columbus, as always, were generous and hosted a barbeque with hot dogs and drinks. It was festive, and I believe everyone that donated had a good time. We try to not only make it easy for the donors to give, but it is also our goal to make the experience as enjoyable as possible,” said Pimentel.

“Right now, there is a nationwide short-

needed blood type. I am young and healthy, and there is no reason I can’t do my part to help,” donor Jose Castro said.

“The process is simple,” he said. “It doesn’t hurt, and afterward, you get a snack. I feel terrific knowing that I am making a big difference for something that takes less than an hour. I encourage others to learn more about the procedure and change their misconceptions that donating is dangerous.”

“We have partnered with the Houchin Community Blood Bank for more than 11

age of blood, and Kern County has been highly affected by this, especially with covid,” Pimentel explained. “When one gives in Wasco, the majority of the donations stay local, and so that is good for the community.”

“When I learned that the bus was back, I was excited and thought, let’s do it again.

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WIHS recognized as model school

Wasco Independence High School beat out over 400 alternative schools in California to win the 2022 Model School Award. Founded in the mid-1970s, WIHS has since played an essential role in the community for those students needing extra

help.

“I feel ecstatic, and especially for the staff, students, and parents as they all worked so hard for the award. It was a team effort,” said Principal Rusvel Prado, a former teacher at the school with over 18 years of experience in alternative education. “This award is important because it proves that what we are doing here is working and that we are giving the best education to our students.”

The California Department of Education and the California Continuation Education Association made the selection. Recognition was based on student attendance, behavior, parent involvement, and commitment to the community. Only 36 schools in California received the award, with WIHS one of three from Kern County.

“I believe we received this award because we have some of the best teachers and staff in the state of California when it comes to teaching at an alternative site. All of them want to be here; they love our students and have a passion for the community of Wasco,” said Prado. “Our school is small with only 140 students, and that allows us to create a warm environment for kids to thrive and realize their full potential.”

“We help youth that has fallen behind in credits, had disciplinary issues, suffered a family crisis, a life change like teen pregnancy, or just didn’t fit in at a traditional high school. We offer a traditional high school diploma and also provide an independent study program after school for those that are parenting minors, have a medical condition, or have a job,” added Prado.

“It starts from the top district office for supporting our small school and providing us with the resources to be that special school,” said Prado.

“The community support is huge, and so is their perception that we are not a school for bad kids; we are a school for kids to move forward,” said former principal of 20 years Martin Lonza.

“Each student is unique, and everyone has a story behind it. For whatever reason, the traditional high school was not a good fit; we offer an education that is accommodating to all.”

The school regularly brings new opportunities to their students like motivational speakers and colleges to help prepare them for their next step in higher education or other post-graduation options. Students can also earn college credits towards their associate’s degree through a partnership with Bakersfield College.

“Here, one can grow from past errors. That instead of failing and giving up, you can learn from your mistakes and keep growing towards your goals and dreams,” said senior Noel Abugan.

After graduating, Abugan plans to go to the Army and believes the school has prepared him for the next chapter in his life.

“They helped me in a lot of ways. My communication skills have grown, and so

has my confidence. Through the encouragement of my teachers and staff, I believe I can achieve anything,” he said.

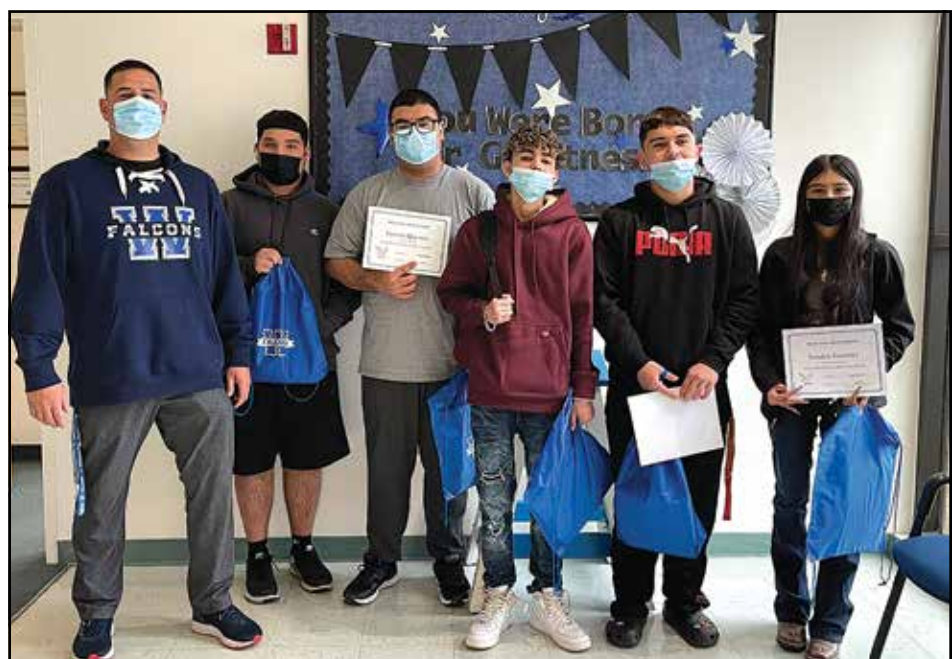
“The most important thing about the school, with it being so small, is that everyone knows each other and there is mutual respect for one another,” Abugan said. “The staff is energetic, they are interested in your success and really enjoy their work. We form bonds that help with the anxiety or stress one might feel at a traditional larger high school.”

Student Ciara Garcia originally came in for credit recovery, but loved it so much that she stayed. Through the early college credit program, she said, “I am super excited to still be in high school and already start working on my future goals.”

In May, WIHS will be recognized at the California Continuation Education Association Conference in Long Beach and will be taking a delegation of students to celebrate.

Author Barry Bongberg visits Kiwanis Club

The Shafter Kiwanis Club hosted local author Barry Bongberg recently, as he told the attendees of his experience writing his book, "Letters to Mom and Dad from Vietnam."

Bongberg also told of his experiences when he returned home from Vietnam after serving bravely for his country.

"Dear Mom and Dad- Letters from Vietnam" is the end result of a series of letters that Bongberg wrote to his parents while he was overseas in Vietnam between 1967 and 1969.

"I didn't even want to think about Viet-

nam once I got back home," said Bongberg, who also said that it wasn't very popular to let people know that you had served in Vietnam, with him and his fellow soldiers being spit on and screamed at. "I didn't even acknowledge that I had been over there for a long time when people I didn't know were taking about the war. I didn't volunteer any information about my experiences over there."

Bongberg told the members of his challenges he faced as a scared, young man who was sent to a foreign land to fight in a war that was not popular back here in the states.

Writing letters to his parents back home helped ease the fright and the loneliness that engulfed him most days while overseas.

"I was just a young, 17-year-old kid who was scared out of his mind," he said. "I had to grow up really quick and these letters are almost a timeline of my growing up in that 13 months."

Bongberg had written a total of 268 letters in the 13 months he had been stationed in Vietnam. To his surprise, when he was cleaning out his parents' house a couple of years ago, he found a stack of letters that he had written that his mother had saved, even in chronological order.

Bongberg's daughter, Erica, started reading the letters and Bongberg then read a few of the letters. Erica told her dad that she thought that this would be a project that would be worth the time of him typing up all of the letters, having a record of them for him and Erica.

"It started as a project that would end once I typed up a copy of the letters for me and Erica, something that we could save those memories in. It just grew from there," he said.

Once Bongberg was finished typing up a copy of the letters for his daughter, he delivered them to her up in Northern California. While at her house, a friend of his daughter's, a publisher named Sara Olsher, read a few of the letters. Finding out what they were, Olsher thought this would be something that a lot of people would be interested in reading, suggesting to Erica that her dad think about putting them in a book.

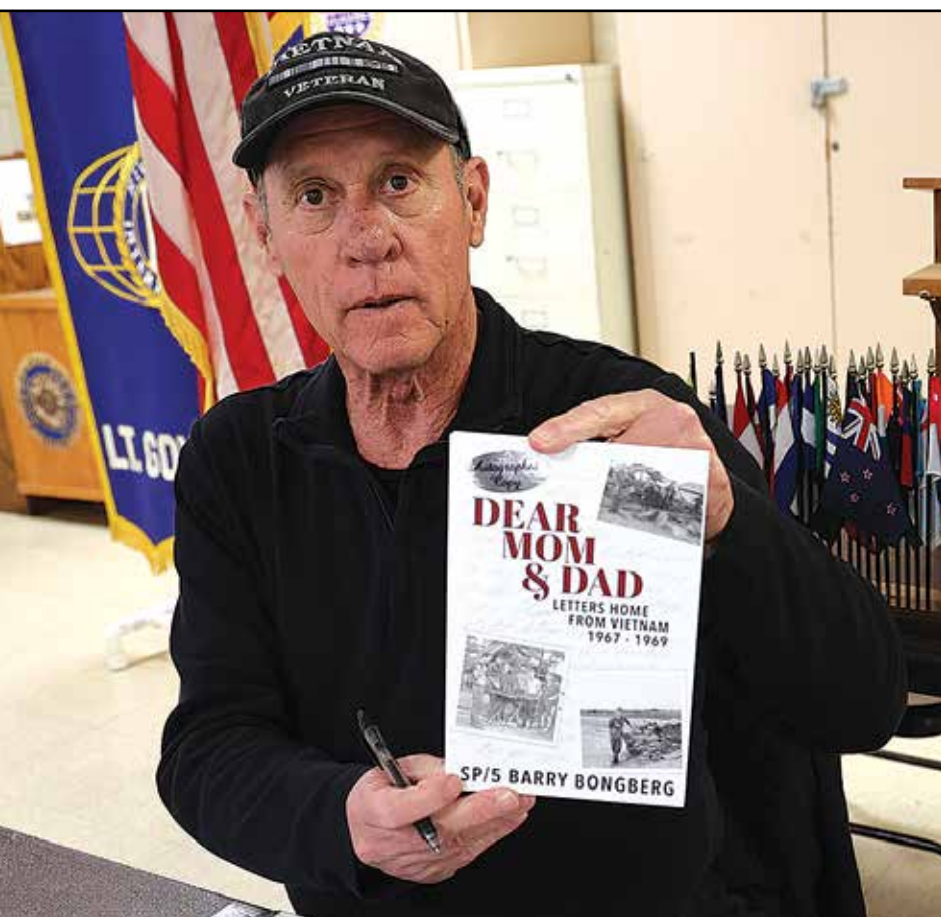
Sadly, Bongberg's

daughter Erica passed away from breast cancer before the dream became a reality, with Bongberg and Olsher working hard on completing the project.

After about a year of hard work, the project was finished and the book was published. It is now available on Amazon.

public hearing by placing them in the city's mailbox located in City Hall at 746 8th St.

A written protest must contain: 1) a statement that the protest is against the proposed charge, 2) the name of the customer of record who is submitting the protest, 3) identification of the assessor's parcel number, street address, or utility account number to which the protest is made, and 4) an original signature and legibly printed name of the record owner of record who is submitting the protest. Protests that do not fulfill these elements will not be counted.

Based on the suggestion from a resident

during the special meeting to streamline the process and comply with the guidelines mentioned above, the council is creating a protest form that will be sent out along with the public hearing notice.

At the conclusion of the public hearing, the city clerk will tabulate all protests received, including those received during the public hearing.

If the number of protests received is insufficient to constitute a majority protest, the clerk may announce the absence of a majority protest, in which case the protest process ends.

A majority protest exists if written protests are timely submitted and not withdrawn

by the record owner or customers of record with respect to a majority (50% plus one) of the parcels subject to the proposed increase.

"Achieving a majority protest is difficult," Hurlbert said. "Even if a majority protest is not met, the protest letters, along with all public comment, is taken seriously by the council and city staff. The questions asked at meetings are appreciated and help staff plan for all scenarios. The city is working very hard to provide as much accurate information to the public as possible."

If the city clerk determines that an apparent majority protest is received, it will

require additional time to validate the protests. The council may adjourn the meeting to allow the validation to be completed on another day.

If a majority is reached, the council is still in the review process regarding next steps. It is expected to have this in place by the time of the public hearing.

The council is working on the list of where the public hearing notices will be sent to ensure that all property owners or account holders (anyone who has an open account with the city that pays for sanitation service) receive the information.

ease, but also remain ready to respond to potential future surges.”

In Wasco, as of Feb. 22, the number of infected people since the pandemic in March 2020 is now 10,475. Also, over this same time frame, the total number of infected in Shafter is 6,553 cases.

Kern County Public Health reported to date there were 1,630 newly confirmed cases of covid-19 in the county, bringing the total confirmed cases to 233,501. According to the KCPH, there have been a total of 2,107 covid-19 deaths since the start of the pandemic.

Last week, Gov. Gavin Newsom released the SMARTER Plan as the next phase of California's response to the pandemic. The plan continues the preparation, flexibility, and systems that have been developed during the pandemic to make the community smarter and better prepared for future emergencies.

Secretary Mark Ghaly held a press conference on Feb. 14, saying on Feb. 28, the state would be reassessing case rates, test positivity, hospitalizations, pediatric hospitalizations, and vaccine rates for a future

potential change to the statewide school masking mandate.

Covid-19 cases and hospitalizations are declining across the State, according to the California Department of Public Health. This is primarily due to the collective efforts of Californians to wear masks, get vaccinated, and get boosted, the agency reported.

In Kern County, 1,138,455 doses of the covid-19 vaccine have been administered to residents. Fifty-five percent of Kern's eligible population and 51% of Kern's total population have been fully vaccinated against COVID-19.

The CDPH said the current hospital census is still overcapacity, but the surge in cases and hospitalizations due to the highly infectious Omicron variant over the last two months had declined significantly.

At present, Kern County has 120 covid-19 related hospitalizations, with 26 in the ICU.

In addition to the KCPH's countywide infrastructure of partner testing sites, they also coordinate mobile COVID-19 testing and vaccination sites throughout the county, and a map with this information can be found on their website www.kernpublichealth.com.
