Public Works having a busy summer

Shafter's Public Works Department has been having a very busy summer, evident by the number of construction sites around town. Public Works Director Michael James gave the City Council an update recently on the numerous projects

The Santa Fe Highway improvement project is continuing and has a stretch of Santa Fe closed from Los Angeles to Galpin. The road will be closed until approximately mid-August. Paved shoulders will be constructed. improving the safety of the drivers as well as bicyclists.

Shafter's Animal Control Department has been serving the community

for decades, making sure four-legged residents are taken care of

with dedication and compassion. Animal Control Officer Nick Riddick is in charge of the department, beginning his post in 2013. Riddick was raised in Fresno and attended college at UC Riverside. He made his way back to the Central Valley and became an animal control officer for Kern County in 2009.

Riddick accepted the position of animal control manager for Shafter, bringing with him the experience and understanding of community involvement and participation. This has resulted in an increase in adoption levels and rescue release rates of animals, while steadily maintaining increased animal intake numbers and calls for service. The shelter does not limit itself to the over 500 dogs and cats it cared for over the last year. In the past, they have handled reptiles, birds and other exotic animals. Riddick has a team of professionals and volunteers who are vigilant in impounding stray and marauding animals, but also dedicated to working toward lowering the annual euthanasia rate. This multipronged approach is accompanied partially with increased See ANIMALS Page 6

There is also a project ongoing at Lerdo Highway, including a full road construction plus replacing all concrete improvements such as curbs and gutters, sidewalks and drive approaches. The work is expected to last 6-8 weeks. The project is at Lerdo Highway between Valley Street and Shafter Avenue.

The city is currently accepting bids for the first phase of the Shafter Aquatic Center project. This will result in the resurfacing of the pool and deck, repairing equipment and getting the pool operational. The estimated date for reopening of the pool is the summer of 2024.

In other city news, First Friday events are being highlighted. The next event will take place downtown by the gazebo area on Aug. 4, from 5 to 10 p.m. There will be food vendors, music, and activity booths

FOCUS ON FARMING | Vernon Crawford 'Vern from Kern' stil working family oper-

Vernon S. Crawford, "Vern from Kern," owner of VSC Farms, Inc., has been farming since he was 10. Now retired, he continues to cultivate his passion for the agriculture industry.

The farm he manages and lives on was established in 1916 when his wife's grandfather came to Wasco from Canada.

"It's the second oldest farm in Kern County," Crawford said.

He took over the operation in 1968 and has continued with the family tradition.

Crawford grows cotton, wheat, alfalfa and dry beans. He used to farm cherries, but he sold that part off. Cotton was his specialty in the past.

He said 2022 was the best year on record for alfalfa. "Prices were in the neighborhood of \$400 a ton. We did very well last year."

Though he added that the price of water was "astronomical" because of the drought.

"Prior to the local service irrigation district, everything was well water. We had to pump it, but then we brought in the federal water, which was reasonable at \$6.50 an acre-foot. Now the price is from \$95 to \$135 an acre-foot."

He said he is going to tear out his alfalfa "because the price is so poor. We're not above cost anymore once you take water processing into account."

Crawford said he has a small farm

toes, wheat, barley dry beans and blackeyed peas."

He partnered with his father in 1960 and continued to farm even after he went to work for Wilbur Ellis. He retired from there at 74. "I worked with them for around 50 years," he said.

Crawford attended Wasco Elementary, Thomas Jefferson Middle School and graduated from Wasco High School in 1955.

"I've been a Tiger all the way."

and shared that it was different in the 1940s. "During the war, it was a big ranch," he said.

Everything changed because the Kern County Land Company had special leases for bare deserts, so a young soldier could come to them to rent that land.

"They had development leases so the person would take the raw desert and level it, put in a well and a pipeline. There was no fee for the first five years, and they could develop the bare land."

"This was the boom in farming postwar. It was a really fair deal."

Crawford is 86 and still involved in agriculture with his farm. His love for the industry dates back to when he was a young boy on his father's farm.

"We primarily grew cotton and pota-

He was ag president at Bakersfield College and Fresno State, where he earned his degree as a Field Agronomist.

'That education helped me be successful as a farmer as it helped me with all the laws, regulations and science involved. Without my degree, it would have been tough.'

Crawford has three children with his daughter, Lori, working with him for 20 years, handling the finances. His other daughter, Jennifer, works for Nutrient Ag Chem in seed sales.

Regarding the next generation managing the farm, he said, "My three kids can probably continue to operate it like I have. Though they may want to sell it."

"The business is in a family trust. It's really up to the trust members (my three kids) to make the decision after I'm gone."

High-Speed Rail to reach milestone in Wasco

The development of the High-Speed Rail is progressing with the current status of the por-

WASCO tion of the project inside the city limits largely com-

pleted by this summer. "In this case the term 'completed' refers to the bridges, underpasses, fencing and other infrastructure, including the large viaduct structure at the south end of town. What will not be complete is the installation of the actual train rails and electrifica-

tion systems." City Manager Scott Hurlbert said. "That work will come later." "The HSR has been working with the county, Shafter and Bakersfield about what next steps will be to the south. The same types of discussions are being held all

along the route in each different jurisdiction. There have been some obstacles the city has faced regarding the high-speed rail.

"Every kind of challenge you can imag-

ine, from changes to our traffic patterns, road closures, the heavy equipment moving around town and the staff time required to review, approve and inspect the work that is being done" have all added up

to big commitment, Hurlbert said. In addition, abandoning the former labor camp complex has created problems with crime, graffiti and vagrants.

Many agreements over a large number of years have been made between the city and the HSR.

"From land transactions, street abandonment, cost recovery, memorandums of understanding about what will happen and agreements about when certain things need to be completed," Hurlbert added.

He said a big agreement was made on the cost of cleaning up the labor camp. "HSR secured grants for the city to do that."

'We are currently in the final stages of getting environmental clearance for the clean-up, and the city will be reimbursed for the clean-up."

There have been benefits that the construction of the HSR has brought to Wasco

"Some jobs have been filled by Wasco

residents during this phase of construction, and going forward we believe more local hires will be needed for the project."

Hurlbert continued, "There has been some increased business to the city because of the workers frequenting our restaurants and other stores."

The HSR will not make a stop in Wasco. Currently, there is Amtrak service in Wasco, and there are plans to continue that service for now. However, in years to come, that may change.

A ribbon cutting event on Thursday, Aug. 3, at 10 a.m. at the corner of Highway 43 and Poso Avenue will celebrate the completion of that segment of the underpass built.

Hurlbert said that it could be decades until the entire planned HSR route is completed.

"From our point of view, we are just very happy that the portion of work in Wasco will be done, and they can move on to other segments."

HIRE Act hopes to address Valley labor short

Congressman David G. Valadao recently joined Rep. Tony Gonzales of Texas to introduce the H-2 Improvement to Relieve Employers Act. The proposed HIRE Act improves H-2A and H-2B visa programs to make them more responsive to employer needs and makes it easier for them to address workforce shortages.

In particular, the act aims to reduce what Valadao calls the bureaucratic red tape often associated with the temporary work visa programs.

This directly impacts workers in the agricultural, construction and trucking industries, where there are the biggest labor shortages. The act will make it easier for employers to hire temporary workers and help fill some of the 9.5 million job openings currently in the country.

'Many times, farmers must hire someone to process that, and a cost is associated. It is about \$3,000 for each worker in fees, time and labor that goes into getting the paper work done."

He said the labor shortages in agriculture cause problems for farmers and their crops.

"There have been years that 20%[of the harvest] is left behind because they don't have labor to harvest it."

Valadao points to the cost of labor shortages for consumers.

"One impact is that these labor shortages affect the economy in that food prices go up."

He said it also results in being less competitive as farmers and as a country.

Valadao added that improving the tem-

these workers more confident to share their application process. And it would improve

"Improving our temporary work visa programs will ensure employers can fill these essential roles to strengthen our economy," Valadao said.

Regarding agriculture and the visa application process, he explained, "The biggest complaint we get from farmers is that they don't have the time to do a lot of the

porary work visa program will help reform our broken immigration system.

"If you make the process easier and more affordable, it will allow more people to use it. For immigrant workers, it will bring them out of the shadows."

"Being an illegal employee, these people are often afraid to speak up if being abused by coworkers or employers."

Valadao said this legislation aims to make

voices without fear of deportation.

The HIRE Act expands the labor certification period from 1 year to 3 years to minimize application hurdles for employers by reducing the number of times a seasonal job needs to be certified. It would permanently authorize waiving the in-person interview requirement for trusted, returning workers who were previously thoroughly vetted to speed up the

job transparency for American workers by requiring the Department of Labor to publish information related to the use of seasonal employment.

When asked if he foresees any pushback in trying to get this legislation to pass, he said, "There is always going to be pushback. It's a small fix to an overall existing program. It's a reasonable approach to how we can get it done."

FEMA extends storm help deadline

Homeowners and renters in Kern County, as well as 13 other counties in California, will have more time to apply for assistance from FEMA. The deadline has been extended to Friday, Sept. 1.

The assistance is for people who have been negatively impacted by the storms and flooding in March. The extended deadline will provide more time for survivors living in remote areas as well as for residents in counties recently designated for federal disaster assistance.

President Biden declared the federal disaster on April 3. It covers damage caused by severe winter storms, straight-line winds, flooding , landslides and mudslides between Feb. 21 and July 10.

FEMA's individuals and hgousehold program may provide disaster assistance

for eligible costs of home repairs, rental assistance for temporary housing, essential personal property, funeral expenses, transportation and childcare.
