City's IT system locked after ransomware attack

The city's IT system was attacked by ransomware over the weekend, resulting in the entire system being frozen and locked.

City Manager Gabriel Gonzales said that their IT department discovered the breach over the weekend. At this time, they do not believe that any personal information has been ob-

Gonzales said that the city's staff is working closely with the FBI to determine the extent of the attack.

"We are working with the FBI on this matter and trying to determine the source and the extent of this unauthorized access," he said.


City Hall doors will be closed un-

The City Council interviewed candidates for the Planning Commission at their regular Council meeting on Tuesday night.

The terms of Planning Commission members Jon Johnston, Kirk Mouser and Peter Frantz are expir-

ing in December 2020, so that leaves three positions open for on the

commission. Frantz and Mouser decided to apply to keep their seats on the board, but Johnston did not reapply.

Frantz and Mouser

were joined by six other candidates who submitted applications to serve on the board. David Calderon, James Harmer, Gus Olvera, John Sanchez, David Piuser and Christine Wilson all wished to be considered.

The Planning Commission appointment is a four-year term with each member receiving a stipend of

Each candidate had a chance to introduce themselves to the council and also answered a series of questions asked by the council members. The candidates come from a variety

The Recreation and Parks District is applying for a \$8.2 million grant for two new pools.

The board unanimously voted to put in

Sharp said that the grant has a Dec. 14 deadline and is part of Proposition 68.

The board had a special meeting the week of Oct. 5 when it decided to move forward with the architect's plans

Sharp said one pool would be a swimming and teaching pool and the other would be for adult/senior swim and other aquatic events and will be solar heated.

Cohorts of students to return to the classroom

Small cohorts of students will return to school Oct. 26. Wasco High School Principal Kevin Tallon announced.

Tallon said because the county is now in the

red tier, which allows schools to bring students back for in-person instruction, small groups of less than six students can return. Schools have been closed since March 17.

The first phase focuses on 'small cohorts' allowing for prioritizing Special Education and other "at-risk" populations including English learners, homeless, foster youth and the few that have internet connectivity issues," Tallon said. "A new cohort will be added every 1-2 weeks."

Tallon said that a modified version of in-person instruc-



High school board candidates discuss priorities

The three candidates for the WUHSD board, Joel Ackerknecht, Sharon Nicol and John Steward introduced themselves to attendees at the virtual candidates' forum on Monday, Oct. 19 held at Peters Funeral Home courtesy of a collaboration between Sharon Sharp from Wasco Is and Vince Martinez from North Kern News.

Both Martinez and Sharp moderated the

Martinez and Sharp asked the same questions to each candidate. The first question concerned the fact that since the district does not have a Human Resource manager, how does the board of trustees ensure that the most-qualified candidates are being hired?

Ackerknecht and Nicol both stated that even though the district does not have anyone with the title of HR manager, the staff has a great system for choosing.

While Ackerknecht acknowledged that the district will often ask the board members to interview candidates, the decision is made by the administrative staff at the district. The next question asked each candidate

how they would fill open positions and whether promoting from within is a priority. Does the district provide a career path whereby employees can be promoted?

Ackerknecht said that he was happy with the team the district has in place and the team uses pathways to promote to higher positions.

"Mr. [Rob] Cobb is an example of that," he said. "Mr. Cobb worked for the district for 25 years and is now the new superintendent.'

Steward commented that Principal Kevin Tallon is a good example of hiring from

Nicol said that she compares hiring from within as corporate development in order for employees to reach their goal of a higher position.

Each candidate was also asked about the Reform Wasco High campaign on student physical and emotional safety and allegations of discrimination. What would the board members say to parents who express concern about repeated accusations? How would you react and what would you say to the student?

Both Ackerknecht and Nicol said that the district closely investigates every accusation from all sides. Steward said that he scrolled through Facebook because he was unaware of the issue. They both also agreed that students need to start using the STOP app, if they do not; there isn't a lot that can be done. All board

"Currently, there are 45 unaccounted students," Nicol said. "We would like to have everyone engaged."


Shafter an even more desirable place

City catches up on budget, cleans up owed fees

The City Council got caught up with its accounting during a recent meeting, authorizing the city manager to write off past-due fees so the budget will be a more accurate reflection of the city.

"This is an accounting mechanism, which the city has to do to get this off the books so an actual balance is shown on the books," City Manager Daniel Ortiz-Hernandez said. "This is a normal accounting

practice that should have been done earlier."

He said the city is supposed to do this every year, but it hasn't been done for a while. The council unanimously passed three resolutions to authorize the write-off of \$3,161.99 for general billing account collection losses, to authorize the write-off of \$41,957.60 for past-due business license account collection and to authorize the loss write-off of pastdue utility billing account collection losses

of \$76,466.16.

Finance Director Jesus Perez-Hernandez gave the report to the council members.

Council members commented on how surprised they were to see so many businesses on the list.

Hernandez said. "Others said they couldn't come up with the money. Several have asked for a payment plan. However, the city can also get its money by those who file tax returns."

"Some of them are out of business," Ortiz-

Ortiz-Hernandez also said that the city

will continue to pursue the fees by either collections or payment plans. Those that have gone out of business are another matter to be discussed.

In other business, the council also authorized the city manager to sign an agreement with TLC Animal Removal Service for animal disposal services not to exceed

TLC would pick up animals that have been hit by vehicles and left on the road for

\$1,800 per year.


