COVID-19 HITS HOME

2 couples positive; serious

As of Sunday, the COVID-19 coronavirus has arrived in Wasco.

Prayer chains have become one of several means of communication during this time of self-quarantine.

A member of a local church started a prayer chain for those in need of prayer.

Prayers were requested for several Wasco residents that have the coronavirus. By the last day of March, four Wasco residents - two couples -- were confirmed to have the virus.

Both couples asked not to be identi-

The first couple booked a trip to Northern Italy, even after friends and relatives asked them not to go. When they arrived at their destination, the trip was canceled, and they were forced to find their own way home, a friend told the *Tribune*.

Both needed hospitalization, and one of the two had pneumonia and is now on a ventilator. Both are currently still under hospital care, according to the

Council meets virtually

The coronavirus crisis dominated the discussion at a special City Council Tuesday night, with members of the public listening in by telephone or watching and listening on their computers.

Items on the agenda were the threat to public services by the CO-VID-19 pandemic and

also talks regarding labor negotiations between the city and several departments. City Manager Gabriel Gonzalez in-

formed the council and the residents listening in that he and his staff will be working on a budget stabilization plan that will work to minimize the damage that is being done by the pandemic. Gonzalez said that they are going to look at the different public services provided by the city and examine them. "There are three types of service,

which are mandated services, core services and discretionary services. Services that are mandatory are services such as water, trash, etc." he explained.

Gonzalez was not specific on what services were considered discretionary or "wants and feel-good" services. These will be looked at and will be deemed ei-

Pandemic is changing life at prison

As the amount of COVID-19 cases rises daily, the numbers of positive diagnoses provided by the Kern County

Department of Health changes almost minute WASCO by minute. And the Wasco Pris-

on is a site where those changes are forcing action to keep In a news release by the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, the department stated it now requires "touchless temperature screening" before being allowed inside.

The policy applies to new prisoners, staff and visitors. Testing for correctional officer new hires and in-service training has been suspended.

The prisons also have suspended rehabilitation programs and group events, such as anger management programs. All parole hearings have been postponed, and all out-of-state transfers have halted.

In addition, the Office of Correctional Education is working to make in-cell education programs available. This

would give inmates the opportunity to earn credits while their interaction is limited.

The CDCR also has suspended all large-scale construc-

tion projects located within a secure area of the prison. Along with temperature screening, all who enter the prison will be asked standard verbal questions regarding their health. A verbal screening is mandatory for every em-

ployee entering work. Staff is allowed to carry two ounces of personal-use hand sanitizer. The incarcerated are being given extra soap

The Wasco Veterinary Clinic is continuing to see patients and fill medications in the midst of a quarantine that has affected the majority of the clinic's staff.

On March 19, a woman came in with her animal and had a cough. A day or two later, the customer contacted the vet clinic

informing them that she had tested positive for COVID-19. All staff that had come into with the woman has quaranbeen tined for

The animal clinic is not allowing people into the office or lobby. Cus-

tomers can call ahead for medications and can pick them up right outside the door. They are still seeing patients, with the owners and

animals remaining outside until the doctor

can see them. If necessary, staff will take the animal into the back to be examined and treated while the owner remains outside the building.

"This is necessary for the health of our

customers and our staff," said Brian Edick, one part of the father-and-son team of veterinarians the clinic, along with his dad, Thomas Edick. "All of our girls have tested negative for the

virus and are just having to wait out the quarantine period."

"There are no customers allowed in the office at this time, but we continue to serve the community during this trying time."



Teen tests positive

First case reported in city; he's home

The coronavirus pandemic has hit close to home with

the information this week a teenager living Shafter had tested positive for COVID-19.

Joel Herrera, 19, confirmed that he has tested positive

for the virus last Thursday, making it necessary to be quarantined for 14 days.

He is quarantined in his room, not able to make any contact with the rest of his family. According to Herrera,

the rest of his family "are in perfect health." They have not been tested because they have no symptoms but are being quarantined as a safety precaution.

Joel works at a pharmacy in Bakersfield, and part of his

job is delivering medications to patients. He believes that this is how he was exposed to the virus.

Herrera said that he didn't have a cough but had been running a fever. His doctor had him tested for the virus because of the presence of the fever. The testing procedure "sucked," Herrera said, including having a long Q-tip put into his nose and swabbed.

"The Health Department told me that after 14 days everything would be normal for me again." He said.

Herrera is finding ways to spend this time in isolation. "I

am usually either watching Netflix, scrolling through social media, reading the Bible -- getting my faith stronger -- and trying to stay positive during this time."

He had some advice for fellow residents.

"Take care of yourself I can't ston ren

"Take care of yourself. I can't stop repeating this, *stay home* and don't take this time of quarantine for granted. I am looking forward to being able to spend time with my family and friends again."

The Kern County Health Department only provides

coronavirus statistics by region. The valley region, which includes 11 ZIP codes including Shafter and Wasco, had 16 confirmed cases of the disease on Tuesday afternoon. Four of those were in Wasco, one man on a ventilator and his wife, both in a hospital, and a second couple quarantined at home with less serious symptoms.

New 'business as usual' in crisis times

"The extension of the governor's order through the end of April doesn't change much in terms of the city's operations," City Manage Daniel Ortiz said last weekend. "Our public offices such as finance/utilities, planning, City Hall, public works office and animal control are closed to the public. Local governments are exempt and must continue to provide essential services."

Gov. Gavin Newsom had issued another executive order banning the eviction of renters who are affected by COVID-19 on Friday.

On that same day, the Kern County Department of Public Health identified a Delano woman as the first person in Kern County to die of the Coronavirus COVID-19.

AT&T users received a message stating

that customers will not have internet or wifi disconnected during the quarantine period for nonpayment after May 14.

WASCC

WUESD still hopes to reopen schools by May 4, while WHS and WIHS staff and students are set to restart by May 5. St. John's Catholic Church will not be

holding mass for an undetermined amount of time.

Most restaurants are offering takeout

only.
Wasco resident Niki Espinoza initiated

a campaign to have everyone in Wasco put their Christmas house lights up. "This is to bring light into this dark time," she said on Facebook. "Let's Light Up the Night!" Checking out Walmart on Sunday, the

parking lot had plenty of empty spaces and carts were lined up to the side of the entrance.

The method of disinfecting hands by use

The method of disinfecting hands by using a disinfectant wipe as you enter the store has been changed to an automatic foamy disinfectant squirting into the palm of the customer's hand, the customer is to rub the hands together as if washing them, and use the paper towel provided to dry off the hands.

Disinfectant wipes for purchase were

nowhere to be found; no Lysol either. Several of the shelves looked as if they had finally been restocked. The dry cereal shelves remain bare except for a box or package of cereals scattered on the shelves.

In an interview with NorthKernNews.

com, Mayor Tilo Cortez commented on a local supermarket price-gouging customers.

Cortez responded that while he doesn't

condone price gouging, he stated that he checked out the market for prices on water. "The store was charging \$5.99 for a case of water and the owner let me look at his books, where he paid \$4.99 for each case of water." he said. "That's not price gouging when he is only making \$1 from each case sold."

Cortez then added that it could be the

store was being taken advantage of when it purchased the water, but he also gave an example of a woman who went to Fiesta Market to buy a dozen eggs, and he was selling them for \$4.99 a dozen. She complained, then left the store heading across the street to get gas at Faststrip. She found a dozen and half for \$2.99, and bought them.

Cortez stated that if anyone feels they are being gouged and are paying too much for a particular item, they are encouraged to call the District Attorney's office at 661-868-2340.

A couple of noticeable items of interest to local shoppers: Gas prices have risen. On March 12 gas was \$2.98 a gallon at some gas stations in Bakersfield, and the Wasco Faststrip was down to \$3.05 a gallon. It's now back up to \$3.59 a gallon at Faststrip. And, Walmart has Easter cards, candy,

baskets and gifts on display in the store. Perhaps a holiday miracle for April 12?

Mason Hollingsworth and his staff have been busy helping keep the children of Shafter equipped with a nutritious lunch and breakfast during the mandated school closures due to the COV-

ID-19 pandemic.

A number of the children in Shafter depend on the schools for lunch during the normal school year, so one of the first questions asked when the closures were announced was "What about the students who need our lunch and breakfast service to survive?"

This question was answered in short order when it was announced that the

food programs would continue through the closures. Monday through Friday, for 90 minutes, the cafeteria staffs at the various schools in Shafter are at work doling out a lunch and a breakfast for each child.

According to Angie Armstrong, lead cafeteria worker at Redwood Elementary and Richland Junior High, they have been giving out 1,100 meals a day.

This service started on March 19 and is continuing until Friday, April 3. They will not be providing the service during the schools' normal Easter break. If needed, the service will begin again on April 14, if

schools are not back in session by then.

"We have been working

really hard, but it is worth it knowing that our kids are getting fed," Armstrong said. On Tuesday, the menu

was a pizza, mixed berry dessert cup, a milk and a juice. The breakfast consisted of a cinnamon cream cheese bagel, juice and milk.

Armstrong also said that their students with special

diets are still getting the same special service as when school is in session. "They will call and let us know when they will be there, and I will get their meals together."

With the likelihood of schools not going into session after the spring break, the food service programs may be a mainstay for the rest of the year.

ther necessary to continue this year or stay suspended and be included in next year's budget

During the public comment portion of the meeting, there were several concerns voiced about the lack of urgency shown by a number of residents regarding the stay-at-home order issued by Gov. Gavin Newsom last week.

Mary Ramon Arellano Garza was concerned about the number of people being seen gathering in different places, not adhering to the recommended limit of 10 peo-

ple gathered in one place.

Gonzalez answered the question by explaining to the residents that the order by Newsom was a recommendation order and depends on public pressure in helping residents comply.

"Our Shafter Police Department, when

it does not conflict with their normal duties, will remind residents who have gathered in excess of the 10 person limit that there is an order in place that discourages the gathering of more than 10 people. This is not an order that is being enforced, other than

public pressure."

Gonzalez also said that the Chamber of Commerce is sending out postcards to businesses in town reminding them that the state has advised all nonessential businesses to stop operations where more than 10 people would gather.

Gonzalez said that he understands the


Gonzalez said that he understands the concern about those who have not taken the order as seriously as others, especially with the increase in cases of the virus in what is being called "the Valley" are by the Kern County Public Health Department. "Just a

couple of weeks ago, we had zero cases in the Valley area and now we are at 16 cases," citing the number of people tsting positive for the virus in the 11-Zip code area.

On the subject of budgets, Gonzalez suggested the council and his staff hold a meeting to start the planning phase for the city's budget for 2020-2021. "We will either hold a workshop remotely, such as this meeting using Zoom, or we may use a venue such as the Shafter Veterans Hall, where we can spread out enough to abide by the social distancing policy that is in place."





Tigers Taekwondo, the award-winning martial arts studio with another location in Shafter, has decided to close its doors until it is safe for their students to return.

Rigo Solorio, owner of the studio, said that it was a tough decision, but ultimately the safety of his students had to come first.

"Some of the parents were very disappointed, but we have to think of the safety of our kids. We are talking about their **REGION**

health and happiness."

In the beginning, some of the parents suggested maybe they could reduce the class size and rotate the students in and out, giving each student a chance to keep practicing. "I thought about having just a few kids at a time in class, but I just didn't feel comfortable putting our students at risk, even if it is just a small chance," Solario said.

The studio boasts several national champions in their fold, and it has a few students who were slated to compete in international competitions. Those events have been put on hold, forcing the kids to wait for their shot at a title. With the postponement of the Olympics until 2021, the qualifying competitions will be pushed back until they can be put on safely.

On a recent visit, Solorio was busy cleaning the studio, buffing the floors, cleaning all of the equipment and mats that are used for their practices and competitions.

"I want to keep busy and keep the studio clean and be prepared for when we get the all-clear to start back up again," he said.

In the meantime, Solorio is preparing a video for the students of different techniques and routines that they can practice to keep them sharp and focused. "We are doing everything we can to make this as easy as possible. We love our kids and can't wait to get them back on the mats. But, we know that keeping them healthy and happy is the most important thing."

Oil and agriculture were struggling in friend, Jorge, a few months ago. Jorge Maldonado came here from Mexico in high



Official: Census key to funding

Carla Hutcherson, partnership specialist for the U.S. Census Bureau, spoke to the Shafter Rotary Club at a recent meeting, telling the crowd about the importance of all Californians being counted in this year's census.

"The amount of funding that we receive on a county, state and local level depends a lot on the results of the upcoming census," she said in her presentation. "We must participate in the census in order to take advantage of all the funds that are available from the federal government."

Hutcherson also wanted people to understand that the information given on the census form is completely confidential and cannot be shared with any other governmental agen-

Over the past year, a campaign has been running to prepare states and local communities for the official counting. Census data impacts funding for things as education

programs, public transportation, Medicare

and Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition



Steve Payne at a recent Rotary Club meeting. Assistance Program, libraries and other ser-

vice organizations and agencies.

There has been reluctance to participate among a good number of communities because a large percentage of residents fear they might face ramifications for not being documented or having family members who are not documented.

"This is not the case," said Angelica

Vasquez, media specialist for the U.S. Census Bureau Partnership. "People can participate in the census without fear. It is important that they are counted to get an accurate count and to make sure our residents get what they deserve in assistance." Hutcherson said the process is

very easy. "It only takes five or 10 minutes and is totally confiden-So far, Kern

County is reported to have a response rate of 20%. This means that over 20 percent of the population of Kern County has selfreported. Some of the outlying rural

areas of Kern County are lagging behind the larger cities in the reports. Shafter currently has a response rate of 18.2%, below the county average by 2% and behind the State of California by 5%. The City of

Wasco is even further behind, with only a little over 15% of its residents participating in the census so far.

Hutcherson said that communities, including Shafter and Wasco, have several programs available for education and community service. "If we want these programs and organizations to get their necessary funding, we all need to do our part to ensure we have a full and accurate count to maximize the assistance our community will receive."


Despite recent events, the Shafter Police Department has stated that they will continue to protect the city with the same efforts that residents have seen in the past.

This way, the Sheriff's Office, Kern County Fire Department and Kern Behavioral Health and Recovery Services are prepared ahead of time if there is the potential of coronavirus, and how to best protect the

individual and the public.

Individuals can create a Smart911 Safety Profile for their household at www.smart911.com or on the Smart911 app that provides critical medical information for those who may be at higher risk of developing a serious COV-ID-19 illness. As identified by the CDC, the vulnerable population includes older adults, and those with a history of chronic medical conditions like heart

disease, diabetes, lung disease, respiratory conditions, and compromised immune systems. When an individual calls 9-1-1, their Smart911 safety profile is automatically displayed, allowing our public safety agencies to send emergency response teams to the right location with enhanced medical data.






Peggy Sue Martin, 62, died unexpectedly in Bakersfield on March 9, 2020, with her family by her side.
