Council to invest in safety

Followup to student injury in accident

In response to an accident that occurred in February when a student was hit by a car while walking to Palm Avenue Elementary School, the City Council took action Tuesday night on making streets safer for pedestrians.

The city will pay \$11,000 for a study to improve safety, which includes protecting children walking to and from school. The council unanimously approved the city manager entering into an agreement with Ruetters & Schuler to perform a pedestrian crossing investigation at three locations:

- Griffith Avenue between Highway 46 and Margalo Street
- Palm Avenue and Margalo Street
- Peters Street and Krista Street.

These three sites represent streets surrounding Palm Avenue Middle School and James Forrest Elementary School.

Councilmember John Pallares requested that the council look into not only adding crosswalks to the streets, but also adding a stop sign, street lights or a blinking sign.

The Wasco Reserves minor league baseball team will be back this winter with a recognizable new name – the Wasco Reserve.

Owner Andrew Dunn said the Pecos League made the decision to make the team's identity more clear.

"We've never changed the name of a team in the history of the league, and this really wasn't much of a change," he said in a telephone interview.



The name is taken from the nearby Kern National Wildlife Refuge, which provides wintering habitat for migratory waterfowl and wading birds. It was once the largest freshwater wetland in the western United States.

Dunn said he couldn't be happier in the way the team has been treated, particularly by the Wasco Parks and Recreation Department. He looks forward to seeing them compete in the winter league beginning in February next year.



Former Congressman David Valadao

Valadao will run again

Former U.S. Rep. David Valadao will run again for the congressional seat he lost to TJ Cox in November.

There has been a lot of speculation whether or not he would run again after his close loss to Cox in the last election. In July, Valadao told the Fresno Bee that he was not making an announcement yet, but let his constituents know that he was looking into it.

Originally from Hanford, Valadao is a managing partner in Valadao Dairy; He has also worked as regional leadership council chairman for Land O'Lakes, Inc.

In 2020, the primary election will take place on March 3 and the general election will be Nov. 3. Valadao is the first candidate to declare his candidacy

for the seat, although Cox has been campaigning rigorously for a while.

From 2010-2012, Valadao was in the California State Assembly before holding the congressional seat from 2013 to 2018. He sat on the Appropriations Committee the last few years, serving on Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, Interior and Environment and Legislative Branch subcommittees.

Valadao's loss was a close one. He had 49.6% or 57,239 votes, while Cox had 50.4% or 57,377 votes – a difference of 362 votes, or .8%.

In 2010, Valadao won election to the California State Assembly by defeating Shafter Democrat Fran Florez in the Nov. 2 general election.

Valadao has three children, and he says one of his top priorities has been to ensure that all children are able to

obtain a quality, affordable education. He believes that parents and educators should have whatever resources are available. He is also a strong supporter of vocational and trade schools.

Valadao was strongly opposed to the High Speed Rail system throughout California, which is running through Wasco and Shafter. "This will cost tax payers billions of dollars with little added benefit," he said. In addition, he co-authored legislation that would allow California voters to stop the project.

What peaked his interest in politics? "As a dairyman and farmer I saw first-hand the need for representation not only in Sacramento but in Washington D.C.," Valadao said.

Valadao said that his campaign plans on holding a meet-and-great in Wasco.

Historical Society unveils upgrade Sept. 7

The Wasco Historical Society invites the public to see its major renovation at a ribbon cutting on Saturday. And there will be plenty to see.

"The grand opening is a great way to see the changes that have been made to the museum," Ellis said. "It's taken almost three years since the museum has been regularly open. September 7 will be a perfect opportunity to celebrate the changes that have been made."

Visitors can check out all the new items hanging on the walls, the many artifacts lined on the top shelves and the antique items like a Mangler (a very large electric roller iron that was used to iron sheets.)

In addition, the Historical Society has a large collection of Wasco High School yearbooks and class pictures.

The grand opening-ribbon cutting ceremony will be Saturday, Sept. 7, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. The VFW will be providing a breakfast of homemade breakfast burritos.

According to member Marlene Swan, the board received a gift of \$50,000, and that is what the directors used to renovate. There are new floors; everything has been organized and repositioned. Different areas highlight different Wasco historic moments in time.

Ellis said that all possessions in the museum have been donated. The museum bylaws state that nothing can be sold or given away. "That's why there is so much old farming machinery available just waiting for a place to be stored," he said.

The first Board of Directors was formed by machine shop owner Warren Carter, principal of Palm Avenue Bob McConnell, kindergarten teacher/rancher Gracia Wedel, Superintendent John Prueitt, Constable Herb Huffman, TOPS Market owner Horace Grisso, realtor Bob Waugh, land-leveling business owner Hattie Giddings, teacher and Wasco socialite Florence Page, teacher Marlene Fannin Peterson, grocery store owner Robert McCombs, farming family Riley Grant, realtor Clayton Steward, and Jesse (Jess) Winn, PG&E and old family who managed the five-dime-store, Sprouse Reitz owner and early farming family Martha Stone.

"At that time, we had about 200 members," board member Bob Ellis said. "A lot of old families belonged to the museum."

Ellis mentioned that the museum used to have annual dinners as a fundraiser, although they haven't done those in a few years.

Although Ellis was born at Mercy Hospital in Bakersfield, his parents brought him home to Wasco when he was just 3 days old

and that is where he grew up and made his life.

Ellis mentioned that the town was started in 1907, and it was incorporated in 1942.

He provided a brief history of how Wasco was named. "It was first called Dewey," Ellis said. "Until another Dewey, California,

ter his son.

Bonham sold lots, and the City of Wasco was on its way.

There is a little bit of history regarding the historical society building. It was originally placed on the Pond School District site and was called Hanlin School. "It was your typical one-room

ter his son.

Following that, the building became a grange hall. After the grange hall, it became a Christian school and finally, it became the museum.

'Still going strong' after 40 years

Montgomery's try at insurance worked out

Wayne Montgomery didn't always want to go into the insurance business. He already had a successful psychology practice in Bakersfield during the 1970s, while Sally was a homemaker raising their kids.

In all started with an insurance company's expansion plan.

"In 1977 Travelers Insurance wanted to establish 100 insurance businesses in California," Wayne said. Delbert Bowles was attending a seminar at California State University, Bakersfield, where two representatives from Travelers gave a presentation on the insurance company. The representatives, Alan Hine and Mr. Parrott, talked to Bowles, and he referred them to Montgomery.

Hine called on the Montgomerys, and Wayne told him he was not interested in selling insurance. Hine then invited them out to breakfast and dinner. "He opened up and

presented a lucrative contract," Wayne Montgomery said. "I told him I wasn't going to give up my counseling practice, but I would give Travelers a chance for 180 days."

After that, the Montgomerys came to a mutual agreement with Travelers before they left for a vacation in Texas.

The agreement was signed in October. By December, Montgomery had reached a goal that was unattainable by most agents. "I sold \$1 million in life insurance and made the 'Million Dollar Round Table,'" Montgomery said. He was then invited to visit Travelers headquarters in Hartford, Conn., where he was wined and dined. His picture was displayed at their home office.

Also during the 1970s, Travelers agreed to have Montgomery sell property and casualty insurance. In 1978, he passed the state exam with flying colors. Now Sally and

End of fiscal emergency

The Board of Supervisors adopted the fiscal year 2019-20 budget on Tuesday. In addition, we also adopted a resolution declaring the end of the County of Kern's fiscal emergency.

By the end of this fiscal year - June 30, 2020 -- the county will have addressed the structural deficit in the General Fund that occurred with the large drop in the price of oil in 2016 which, in turn, resulted in a large decrease in the property tax from oil-producing properties. Progress has also been made in addressing and mitigating the deficit in the Fire Fund. That work continues.

Declaring the end of the fiscal emergency doesn't mean a start to wasteful spending. It doesn't mean there won't be challenges in the future. It doesn't mean an end to our LEAN/Six Sigma efforts that have produced

savings and efficiencies across departments. A culture of continuous improvement and getting the most out of each hard-earned tax dollar must continue.

It does mean that the county employees and the supervisors have done the hard work and made the tough decisions to address and confront our budget deficit. It means that in next year's budget, if, among other factors, our local and national economy continues on its current trajectory, the board will be able to replenish reserves that have been used. It means we will be able to consider cost-of-living adjustments for our employees that have patiently stuck with us. It means we will hopefully be able to address at least a few in a litany of major maintenance projects that have been deferred for many years.

Fully mitigating the General Fund deficit has been a difficult and often painstaking achievement. Thanks are due to our current and former chief accounting officer, their staff, all of our department heads, all of our employees (some of the best people I've ever met) and all of our bargaining units for their patience and professionalism. Many of our service providers and suppliers have also stepped up to help the county through the last few difficult years.

This is a great moment for Kern County. We should take a little time to reflect on what we've been through and congratulate each another on completing the task.
