Council votes for program

The City Council looked at ways to get rid of graffiti in the city – and is moving on a plan.

Director of Public Works Biridiana Bishop introduced Deputy Public Works Director Chuck Soblewski at Tuesday night's meeting. He presented a report requested by the council on how remove graffiti.

The report included two options that the staff considered realistic for the city.

A request was made by Councilmember Danny Espitia at the Dec. 7 meeting to use Measure X funds to increase staffing in the Public Works Streets Department, adding two new positions to the department and purchasing a new vehicle and equipment for the purpose of graffiti removal.



The City Council voted to purchase a Dustless Blasting DB500 Mobile S for graffiti removal.

"We have to get rid of graffiti as soon as it appears," Espitia said.

Soblewski presented two options to the council: Option 1 includes hiring two new personnel, purchasing a new vehicle and graffiti abatement equipment with Measure X funds, which would cost the city \$651,000 over five years or \$130,000 per year.

Option 2 calls for adding overtime for two personnel when needed and new equipment, which would be a total cost of \$171,000 over five years, or \$37,000 per year.

They chose the cheaper option, which included the purchase of a Dustless Blasting DB500 Mobile S, which directs a blast of sand and water over the graffiti and erases it from a surface without damaging the paint previously used to cover up older graffiti.

opened his Wasco practice. Sharma and his partner, Dr. Rahima Sanya, practice surgery without insurance. Their prices, including office visits, are determined on a case-by case basis. He loves Wasco, and his pregnant female patients receive an ultrasound every time they see him. “I feel it’s important to keep an eye on a pregnancy with every office visit,” he said. “Things can happen in an instant, and it [problems] might be fixable if caught soon enough.” His greatest joy is seeing the expressions on his patient’s faces after he shows them their ultrasound and everything is going well. He points out where the baby’s heart is so they can see it beating, and if they want to know the gender of their baby, he tells them that, too. “I’m from a small town in India,” Shar-

ma said. “Being in Wasco makes me feel like I’m home. I love this community.” Sharma feels it’s better to be healthy and safe than to worry about cost. “Young girls who want to go on birth control can be seen for free in my office,” he said. “For the pregnant women, the weekly ultrasounds are also free.” Sharma is a graduate of GMC Amritsar, Punjab, India, a government medical college established in 1864. Married for 25 years, Sharma has a 13-year-old daughter and an 8-year-old son who both attend St. John’s Lutheran School in Bakersfield. The Wasco office is open Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. He has a staff of two; both Laura Ruiz and Emily Russell have been with his office since he opened in Wasco.

“Our current graffiti abatement equipment is from 1980,” Sobolewski said. “We are outdated, and there is new technology such as the equipment I’ve pictured.” He then showed a brief video of what the machine could do in removing graffiti. “This machine is eco-friendly, multi-functional and once the graffiti is removed, the machine can be used in other areas of the city,” Sobolewski said. “It’s dustless blasting.” Mayor Pro Tem Danny Espitia asked if

this equipment could help with landscape maintenance in the city. He was told by Sobolewski that there are many different uses for the equipment, including with landscaping. In other council business, Sergeant Peter Martinez gave an arrest report and said that on Jan. 11, Sheriff’s Activities League kids cleaned up a lot of graffiti in the city. “I’m proud of the youth we have,” Martinez said. City Manager Daniel Ortiz-Hernandez also announced that Bakersfield Boxers and Bullies would be holding another animal clinic from March 7-9.

What's it like at lunch at Clemens

I literally thought I had won the lottery when I entered my freshman year of high school. The selection of entrees, such as burgers, pizza and desserts was plentiful; however, my family moved to northern California during my later high school years and I ended up at a brand-new school where there was no cafeteria and we all ate outdoors. During the rain, we ended up in the hallways or sequestered in the small amphitheater. Meals were provided by vending machines, which gave us hot buttered French bread, cold sandwiches and ice cream. I don't remember if we had soda machines, but I'm pretty sure we did.

With the changes in schools over the years, there has been a major shift in school lunches. Districts have always recognized that students need a good breakfast to begin their day and that wasn't happening back then, and schools began seeking programs to provide breakfast and lunch for those students who couldn't afford to buy a school lunch.

The WUESD lunches are provided by the Community Provisions Program, which gives each Clemens student free breakfast and lunch. Guests pay \$2.75 for breakfast and \$4.25 for lunch.

I remember when having bologna sandwiches and cream corn being plopped on a

tray by an elderly woman with a white apron and hat. And yes, they were "plopped."

A poll of what students' favorite cafeteria food was almost unanimous: Round pepperoni pizza day is the most-popular lunch, while pizza sticks were the most unpopular item served.

A close second in popularity was a cheeseburger, and yet for others it was the least-popular meal. A couple of students love the spaghetti; most of the students didn't like the barbecue pulled pork sandwich.

"My favorite lunch is the round pizza," fourth-grader Hailey Crawford said. "My least favorite is the pulled pork sandwich." Fifth-grader Zenaïda Amador said that the orange chicken was her favorite, and she didn't like the pizza sticks.

A couple of the transitional kindergarten and kindergarten students were excited about having orange chicken for lunch and said it as their favorite.

The district's Food Services Department works to provide well-rounded and nutritious breakfasts and lunches.

Jenkins stated that the district department is composed of 48 employees and six school sites. "Each site cooks and prepares meals in-house for all students," he said. "We feed an average of 3,000 lunch meals and 1,000 breakfast meals and 400 snacks

daily districtwide."

In addition, the district also provides food services to surrounding school districts such as Beldridge, Blake, Buttonwillow, Elk Hills, Fruitvale, Linns Valley Maple and North Kern Christian.

"WUESD is able to provide free meals to all the students in our district for breakfast, lunch and snacks through CPE Provisions," Jenkins said. "This money is available from the federal government, and the WUESD is looking into starting a supper program for all students attending after-school activities." She said this could happen before the school year end.

Jenkins added that students must eat their meal at school and can only take one or two items home, such as a piece of fruit.

"Also, the district just began working with the Waste Hunger Not Food Campaign organized by the Kern County Health Department. With this program, the district is able to donate leftover food to participating local churches in Wasco. The current churches receiving donated foods are New Generation (Monday and Friday) and Canyon Hills (Wednesday).

Food Services Assistant Leticia Granados tapped a photograph on her computer screen as each K-4 student's photo appeared to verify that student had a lunch that day.

The students greeted her by name, and she even took a short time out to help a little girl tie her shoes before tapping on the next student's photo.

Granados does the same procedure for breakfast for the K-4 students as well. "It took me about two months to learn who each student was," she said. "Once lunch is over and I have a student's picture still up on my desktop, I ask the other students whether or not child was in school that day. We want to make sure everyone gets a healthy meal. I paid \$4.50 for my orange chicken lunch, and I thought it was very tasty, with just the right amount of crunch to each bite. Each piece of chicken had plenty of flavor. I also had some green salad but declined the orange slices. I did grab a bag of carrots to take with me for an afternoon snack and drank low-fat chocolate milk.

I want to compliment the chef and let everyone know Clemens' Assistant Principal Jan Hummel, the students and the cafeteria staff created a positive experience with terrific lunchtime company and good cafeteria food. I observed a lot of genuine warmth and caring for each other during the meal.

COUCH'S CORNER

Oil production important to county

DAVID COUCH

At the Board of Supervisors meeting on Jan. 14, I have to admit, I have never been more proud. The room was packed by concerned citizens from all walks sharing their concerns and points of view on oil production in Kern County, with key officials from Sacramento present. While the state has been talking about the "managed decline" of the oil industry, we here in Kern County have been concerned about those statements and their impact here. In my letter to the state dated Dec. 17, I invited the state to join us for a discussion and we had quite an experience.

People from all over Kern County came and shared with the state officials and each other why Kern County oil production is so important to the state, the country and the world. We showed state officials who may be overinfluenced by the voices in Sacramento why Kern County is the energy capital of the state. We also have more solar and wind energy than anywhere else in California. If the state officials listened, and take

back to Sacramento what they heard, who knows, maybe we can change the trajectory California is on, with important impacts far beyond Kern County.

Kern County sits on huge reserves of oil, and this oil is a huge economic driver of our local economy. But there are those who suggest that issues such as global warming require oil production be discontinued, and state officials, through their regulatory and permitting function, have started the process of managing oil's decline in California.

Problem is, no place in the world is oil production more closely monitored and regulated than in California. Curtailed oil production in Kern County will not influence our appetite to consume oil in our cars, homes, and elsewhere, so until we curtail usage, curtailing oil production simply

requires we get our oil from other countries, where human rights may be abused, and where environmental regulations are lax.

In California, oil production is tied to carbon credits and actions that work toward a carbon neutrality, which is what climate activists desire. Only in California can oil production be tied to these positive steps to curtail global warming. All other oil production will comparatively create a worse-off planet than oil production in California, especially Kern County. It's time we realize that until oil can be replaced to the scale needed for a planet with 8 billion people, we need to produce a cleaner and safer oil here.

Here in Kern County, oil is not the enemy, but a partner, and as they stated at the BOS meeting, they are willing to find solutions beyond just putting our folks to

work. Research will help us find solutions, not buying our oil from other countries. Cooperation will be the key to managing this climate threat, and that means the oil producers and the environmental activists need to be in the same room, which, by the way, they were during the BOS meeting. It's a start.

This is far too complicated to debate all the science, economics and other impacts, here in this article, but in this county, we can continue this discussion, with each other and with the state. We started with a BOS meeting that had more attendees than I have ever seen, and more passion than I can remember, and more important than we can comprehend. It started here, now, with you. And I have never been more proud to be part of this community.




